TROOPS GATHERED AT THEIR ARMORIES

READY TO MARCH ON A MINUTE'S NOTICE

Entire National Guard of the State Will Be Sent to San Francisco If Conditions Require It

Sacramento, Cal., May 8.—The adjutant-general admitted today that the state's entire national guard was ready to be sent to San Francisco at once, if called. It is known the Southern Pacific is prepared to rush the men from various stations into San Francisco on special trains, 25 minutes after being ordered out.

Los Angeles, May 8.—Governor Gillett stated this morning he did not believe it necessary to send troops to San Francisco. He thinks yesterday's riot will have a deterrent effect. He takes an optimistic view of the ultimate settlement, and said if troops were sent there would be a cessation of violence in 15 minutes or some one would get hurt.

San Francisco, May 8.—Disregarding Mayor Schmitz's proclamation, and the labor council's appeal to the people to refrain from gathering in the vicinity of the car barns, and undeterred by the determination to shoot to kill by the strike-breakers, a great crowd gathered early around the Turk street barns, determined as ever to prevent the running of cars. An augmented force of police is on hand, including mounted men, an automobile squad and officers on foot, armed with riot guns. Union pickets pushed their way through the crowd, exhorting the crowds not to indulge in violence. Inside the car barns and yards there was a great stir, and bustle of men preparing for moving the cars as soon as they had finished breakfast. Arms and ammunition were passed around to the crews selected to take the cars out, and those who were to remain within prepared themselves for a siege.

Los Angeles, May 8.—At 2 o'clock this morning, acting under orders from Sacramento, the Seventh regiment was ordered under arms at once. The total enlisted strength of the regiment is over 800.

San Francisco, May 8.—As expected, the sending of the militia to this city, as indicated by the orders given the Seventh regiment to place itself under arms at once, has not dismayed the strikers. They are confident of winning the strike, even should the federal troops be called. A small crowd remained in the vicinity of the Turk street barns throughout the night, but were not permitted to approach nearer than one block from the barns. In anticipation of the storming of the barns a strong armed guard is on watch from dark to dawn inside the stockade. No overt act was attempted. The night passed quietly.

San Francisco, May 8.—At noon it was announced that no cars would be run until 2 o'clock. The will then be sent out of the Oak and Broderick barns, instead of the Turk street barns. This change in the plans is the result of a conference between Calhoun and General Manager Chapman and the police commissioners. The cars will not go through the burned districts. Chief of Police Binan, in a statement this morning, declared that the state or federal troops were not needed. He said his men were amply able to cope with the situation. If there is any demonstration of violence he will send out the mounted rifle squad, which was used so effectively at the time of the draymen's strike six years ago.

HENRY CLAY PIERCE. Henry Clay Pierce, President, Placed Under Arrest.

St. Louis, May 8.—Henry Clay Pierce, president of the Waters-Pierce Oil Company, was arrested today on a warrant from Texas. It is reported that there are perjury and other charges in the warrant. He was forced to take the trip to the Four courts with an officer, and then to be taken before United States District Judge Adams upon a writ of habeas corpus directed to the chief of police.

BURNS O'BRIEN FIGHT

Los Angeles, May 8.—The betting on the Burns-O'Brien fight is brisk. O'Brien continues an 8 to 10 favorite. Battling Nelson arrived this morning, and will be in O'Brien's corner tonight. Considerable Burns money is in sight, and it is expected there will be a shift of the odds before the men enter the ring. Both sides say there is no chance of a hitch in the fight. It is said they have agreed to split the purse, which will be far less than \$30,000. The advance sale indicates a record-breaking house.

MUST HAVE MISLAID HIS PIPE

Washington, May 8.—Departing from the usual custom, Secretary Bonaparte was at his office at 9 o'clock this morning to take up the affairs of the office. It is believed that the President told him that he wanted immediate action in the case of January, who is recommended for release from Leavenworth prison, and other cases. Bonaparte has put in but 20 working days since he took the portfolio, and big affairs of the department are at a standstill. He resides at Baltimore.

Washington, May 8.—At 11 o'clock the pardon attorney of the department of justice arrived at the White House with Bonaparte's recommendation for January's release.

TRANSPORT STEAMER WRECKED

Buenos Ayres, May 8.—The French transport steamer Polton is reported wrecked, en route to this city, off the coast of Uruguay. One hundred passengers and the crew are believed to have perished. She sailed from Marseilles April 6. Montevideo, May 8.—The custom officials at Jose Ignacio, off which port the Polton went ashore, saved 50 of the 300 souls aboard. It has not yet been learned how many others were rescued.

HAYWOOD TRIAL BEGINS TOMORROW

MOTION OF THE DEFENSE IS DENIED

Judge Holds It Should Have Been Made Before Date Set for Trial

Boise, May 8.—Judge Freemont Wood today denied the motion of counsel for Haywood, accused of complicity in the murder of Governor Steunenberg, for a bill of particulars. The plea was elaborate, but the court held the application should have been made before the trial date was set, or the defendant had made a plea of not guilty. The defense took an exception, which the court ordered recorded. The trial will proceed Thursday with the selection of the jury.

None of the attorneys on either side would discuss the decision. This action was forecasted as an indication of how the people regard the trial. A business man this morning, who is on the pane, asked to be excused, "because he did not want to participate in a shoot with the gun club." The judge did not like the idea, but finally excused him, the attorneys agreeing.

LINEMEN STRIKE.

Four Hundred Quit Work Through Sympathy.

San Francisco, May 8.—Four hundred linemen employed by the Pacific Telephone Company, walked out this morning in sympathy with the striking telephone operators.

An early settlement of the telephone strike is promised, as the result of a conference between the mayor and representatives of the company and strikers. The mayor urged the company to offer a compromise in the matter of recognition of the union, and to permit the girls to return to work temporarily under the old wage scale. It is believed the proposition will be accepted. In view of these developments the linemen decided to continue work this morning.

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
