### Noted Speaker Coming--

Rev. Arthur Reeves Vosburgh, C. S. B., of Rochester, N. Y., will lecture at the Grand theatre Tuesday evening on Christian Science. Rev. The state officials have in mind the establishment of a feeding pond by the state. The governor expects to be back in time to attend the farmers' institute at Stayton, Saturday, May 25.
