CORNER STONE OF INSTITUTE.

First Fitting Testimonial to the Founder of Oregon City After 50 Years.

It has remained for Rev. A. Hillebrand, pastor of St. John's church, to initiate a movement to found a permanent memorial to Dr. John McLoughlin. Father Hillebrand conceived the idea of building an institute, and the school is now under construction. Archbishop Christie has aided liberally and voluntary contributions are being received. The school will cost about \$12,000, and will be three stories in height. It will be dedicated and opened in time for the fall term next September. The ceremonies attendant on laying the corner stone will be next Sunday, in the presence of the archbishop and notable company. Senator John M. Gearin, Father Sherman a son of General William T. Sherman, will be among the speakers.

Nearly 50 years have elapsed since Dr. John McLoughlin, the founder of Oregon City, passed away at his home in Oregon City. During all these years only a simple marble slab has marked his quiet grave in the church yard of St. John's parish. No fitting memorial has ever been created for the man who may be called the first real governor of Oregon. In the state house at Salem there is an oil painting of the doctor, and he has a memorial window in St. John's church.

Dr. John McLoughlin was born in Riviere du Loup, Canada, in 1784, of Scotch-Irish parentage. He entered the service of the old Northwest Fur Company when a youth of 16. In 1824 he was sent by the Hudson Bay Company to Astoria, and assumed absolute control of the whole Columbia valley and the northern coast. Under his direction were 1000 Canadians and half-breed servants of the company, and he was in absolute control and autocrat of 100,000 Indians.

He gained control by superiority of intelligence and priority of will. His plans were fully laid, and no one was permitted to question them.

Dr. McLoughlin provided a market for wheat with New Archangel, in Alaska, and to the Sandwich Islands. He helped Jason Lee, the first missionary, and also Whitman and Spaulding. In every way Dr. John McLoughlin nourished the young settlements he had established.

His humane and benevolent treatment of the Americans who immigrated drew down the censure of the English and his policy was stigmatized as imbecile. His generosity was unsatisfactory to the Hudson's Bay Company, and he was obliged to account for every cent's worth of goods that he let go, with a personal loss of some \$12,000.

In the last years of his life Dr. McLoughlin's consolation was his religious hope and faith. He was embroiled in a long and tedious wrangle for his claim, which now marks the site of Oregon City.
