WESTERN FASHION FANCIES

There is perhaps more striking individuality of line among the dressy and skirt or three-piece costumes than among the bodice and frock. Directorate lines and the XV lines as well still appear in the designer of handsome silk and coats and many of the hand-made models of the coat and skirt show coats on these lines. The long plain skirt ending at the top and widening simultaneously at the bottom. Coat skirt are perhaps of the same materials or a coat of taffeta faille, duchesse, taffeta or cloth may be combined with a skirt of sheer silk in the same or harmonizing color. In the latter case there is a bodice or blouse of net or dyed to match the coat and lined by cream or white is a probability of accompaniment. ugly lines and accentuate graceful ones. The most popular, not necessary the smartest, model is the tight fitting, only long enough to reach to the waistline and with three-quarter length sleeve. A narrow line of fancy waistcoat buttons and either braid or folds of the material comprise the trimming. The waist coat plays rather an important part in the costume; it is braided or embroidered, or another material, and in either lighter or darker in color, and certainly adds immensely to the more elaborate effect without taking away altogether the severe tailor-made appearance. Medium length sleeves are the rule, not long coat sleeves, but long enough to almost reach the waist. The favorite shape is a puff, much larger above the elbow than below, but even below the elbow not tight fitting, while the turned back cuff is a more fashionable finish than the plain straight band.

A more straight up and down appearance is to be noticed in skirts, and at the same time they are not allowed to hang forward nor to drop at the back. To be really smart they must hang the same length all around and clear the ground thoroughly. This if they be short. When long they are a trifle longer in the back, but fall on the ground both in front and at the sides. A lightweight cloth serge or chenille walking gown is almost a necessity for spring and autumn; and yet in the spring there is not so long a season to wear so warm a gown, and a voile or silk gown becomes far more comfortable.

OPPOSE CONVICT LABOR

Carpenters Union Demands That They Be Employed on State Highways Only

The Salem Carpenters' union had a big meeting Saturday night and took further action in the matter of convict labor employed on state and county buildings and public work of all descriptions. The general trend of the speakers was that it was not just to laboring men to employ convicts at any kind of work but on state highways. They even opposed employing them to do work on city or county roads. The committee of the Carpenters' union was further instructed to protest to state officials against the practice and to condemn legislation that provides for the employment of convicts in erection or any work in connection with new state buildings. The Salem board of trade has appointed a committee composed of Aug. Husekstein, A. F. Hofen and F. N. Derby to co-operate with the Carpenters' union in protesting against employment of convicts to do mechanical work of any kind. These two committees are to look after the matter with public officials.

Some Arguments Answered

One of the speakers took up the argument that there is money saved to the taxpayers by employing convicts. He said if that were true taxes should be lower while it was a notorious fact that there was more paid than ever by the owners of small homes. It was argued that common labor was so high and could not be obtained. The reputation of being a scab town was a greater detriment to Salem than the reputation of scarcity of labor and high wages. He said it was a fact now that laborers and mechanics were leaving Salem because there was no steady work, while convicts were being run into all kinds of jobs. Salem should have the reputation of

paying high wages and people would move here to live as they could live here 25 per cent cheaper than at Portland. Even if some work had to suffer from scarcity of laborers it was better than to have a single man driven to leave here by employing free convict labor. The Carpenter's union are planning a big demonstration at an early day, to emphasize their position on this matter.

Where Convicts Are Employed.

Appropriations made by the last legislature providing money which is to be expended and is being expended partly or wholly in employment of convict labor is as follows:

For sheds and buildings at the state fair grounds, \$20,000.

For new wing to the state asylum and making a million brick, \$100,000.

For clearing grounds and erecting state institute for the feeble minded \$150,000.
