SALEM'S SCHOOL TEACHERS

Corps Elected and Salaries Are Raised for Ensuing Year

At the regular meeting of the Salem school board Saturday evening teachers for the coming year were elected, and, aside from electing the substantial corps of teachers who have given entire satisfaction in the past several years, persons chosen who will add not a little to the strength of Salem's teaching corps in the future.

The teachers elected for the year are as follows:

High school—E. T. Marlatt, B. C. Eastham, John E. Smith, Lila Swafford, Elizabeth Topping, Jean Tuttle, Lila Townsend.

East school—J. S. Graham, Helen Mason, Eva J. Savage, Miss M. L. McCormick, Lena Stillwell, Emma Amer, Adora Cochran, Ellen Nelson, Lena Clark, Bertha Lick.

North school—G. A. Peebles, Miss Emily Rodney, Mabel Mickey Laura, Ada G. Dayton, Eva Beal, Regans, Carrie Chapel.

Park school—W. M. Smith, Ella Welch, Lena L. Miller, Amy Mar-Minnie Cornelius, Alma Pohle, Elaine E. Bushnell, Allena Mellen, Lincoln school—H. H. Belt, Louise Angier, Grace Bellinger, Catherine Pooler, Orlotta Krause, Martha Wermer.

Another important part of the work was the raising of salaries, as contemplated for the past year or more. It has been acknowledged that salaries should be increased in proportion to the increased cost of living, and also for the vital reason that it is impossible to get the best of teachers unless the district pays as much as others for like work. With this in mind the board adjusted and raised salaries as follows:

J. M. Powers, city superintendent, from \$105 to \$125, or \$1500 per year; E. T. Marlatt, principal of the high school, from \$95 to \$120, or \$800 per year; J. S. Graham, principal of East school, from \$84 to \$100; Principal Peebles of the North school, from \$84 to \$85; W. M. Smith, of the Park school, from \$84 to \$85; H. H. Belt, principal of the Lincoln school, who succeeds E. T. Marlatt from \$73 to \$78; Miss Mar-

garet Cooper, principal of the Central school, from \$63 to \$68; John E. Smith, instructor in the high school, from \$78.75 to \$80; Barry C. Eastham, instructor in high school from \$75 to \$90; all other high school instructors from \$63 to \$70. All grade teachers will start at \$50, and their second year of work will get \$60 per month.

The board feels especially well pleased with the acquisition of the new teachers to the Salem school, as among them are some of the very best to be found in the land in their respective lines of work. Miss Jean Tuttle is from Nebraska, and leaves a more lucrative position, but was compelled to come West, owing to the health of her mother, who will reside for the time being in the mountains near Mill City. She takes the place of Miss Ruth Milrore in the high school, and will undoubtedly make a very acceptable teacher.

Miss M. McCormick, of Lebanon, will succeed Miss Eva Marlatt at the East school; Miss Emily Rodney, of Grants Pass, will take the place of Miss Ethel M. Fletcher at the North school; H. H. Belt, of North Yamhill, will succeed E. T. Falting as principal of the Lincoln school.

One vacancy, that caused by the resignation of Miss Richards, has not as yet been filled.

The matter of repairing and varnishing the seats in the various school buildings, and to put them in a clean, presentable condition, will be taken up by the committee on repairs at the request of the board.

The work will be done during the coming vacation, and nearly all the rooms in the different schools will be gone over except those in the high school. Superintendent Powers said that there was a dire need to place the seats in a good clean condition, that many of them were dirty and thereby unhealthy. The estimated cost to repair and renovate the seats will be about 30 cents per seat. The work will consist of scraping off the old varnish, dirt and ink spots and to revarnish the desks and make such other repairs as will be found necessary.

LAW GLASS RECEIVE DIPLOMAS

President Coleman, of Willamette, Confers Six L.L.B. Degrees

The members of the 1907 law class of the Willamette University received their degrees last Saturday night before an admiring audience in the First M. E. church of this city. The rostrum and choir loft were prettily decorated with roses and green and the class numeral "07" was suspended from the alcove above.

As Professor Roberts rendered in his usual pleasing manner a processional march the class led by Dr. Coleman and Dean Reynolds filed in and amid applause took their places in the choir loft. Rev. W. H. Selbeck led the invocation which was followed by a vocal selection "Good Night, Good Night, Beloved" by a quartet composed of Misses Ketchum, Hales, Messers, Bisbee and Strang. Mrs. Mervin Hug then sang "Il Bacio" in good voice. As an encore she rendered "Tis the Last Rose of Summer."

Mrs. Hug has an excellent voice and received prolonged applause from the appreciative audience.

Dean Reynolds in a short but appropriate speech presented the class to Dr. Coleman who conferred upon them the degree of L. L. B. The Stalwart quartet was not able to appear as programmed and for its number, Dr. Heritage rendered a vocal selection which was well received.

Hon. Alfred F. Sears of Portland was introduced and in a pleasing and dignified manner gave the address of the evening. The judge is an entertaining speaker and handled his subject in a masterful manner.

Among the many truths presented he said, the law does not consist simply of cases but of principles. All principles of law are found in the decision of all cases gone before. These decisions are the landmarks which discover the geography of the country in which you students are now about to enter. New and surprising discoveries will be made.

It is essential, if the student wishes to make the most of his chosen life work, that he get to the sources of the law. The courts cannot contradict what has been settled as law. It is well to recall the obligation of the Anglo-Saxon to the great Roman law, Civil law, in the time of the Roman ascendancy, depended upon the will of the emperor. At that time our Anglo-Saxon liberty was not attainable. There is strong evidence of vitality in the law which is shown by its development and growth.

Law is not a complete structure, but a living force. Codification has been the ambition of jurists but such codification still remains a problem which is far from being solved. A study of institutions is, instead, being made.

We have a solemn duty to perform and we must be true to self, true to conviction and true to the common law. And then, "This above all, to thine own self be true and it must follow, as the night the day, thou canst not then be false to any man."
