SHINGLE PRICES BROKEN

Local Lumbermen Say the State Fair Board Has Gone Into Business

It is charged that the State Fair Board, through its secretary, has gone into the shingle business, offering to supply the market at cut prices. Some builders are reported to have bought shingles as low as \$3.00, and even \$2.85 per thousand from the state fair supply.

The lumber yard men held a conference this morning, and claim they cannot compete with the state shingle business. One of them said:

"It seems that the retail lumber and shingle merchant is to be gradually forced out of his position, since the state boards have branched out in this business. Having a very liberal amount of state money to carry on the same, they are able to furnish material to contractors and other customers of the retail lumber merchant at prices that would soon force him out of business. It seems to me to be out of place for the state officials to enter into competition with the legitimate retail business of the city."

Oregon Crop Conditions.

Edward S. Beals, director of this section of the crop and weather bureau, has this report for the past week:

"The weather during the week was very favorable. Following the rains of last week there were from three to four warm, sunny days, which were followed Thursday by increasing cloudiness and light showers in the eastern counties. By Friday the rain area had spread to include practically all sections of the state, and the showers were not only heavier, but in some places were attended by thunder. The rains continued throughout Saturday and Sunday. The rainfall was heaviest in Southern Oregon and the Columbia river valley. In the districts where the droughty conditions were only partially relieved by the rains last week, the rains of this week have been sufficient to break up the drought, and the situation is greatly improved. The temperatures averaged above normal, and it was unusually warm during the fore part of the week. During the showery period the afternoons were cooler, but there was very little change in the night temperatures. The average amount of sunshine was below normal, and there was no damaging frosts or high winds."

Whistling for Sinners.

Salem special May 20: The Willamette University authorities would not tolerate Evangelist Haudenschield's method of singing when introduced at the chapel exercises this morning. Haudenschield is conducting revival services at the First Methodist Episcopal church, and last night introduced whistling during the singing of the gospel hymns. Certain students, believing if it were good form to whistle at church it would be equally good at University chapel exercises, attempted it this morning, but were requested to abstain, which they did. Haudenschield, although orthodox in his preaching, has recourse to dramatic gestures and attitudes to attract attention.

Proposals Invited.
Proposals invited for supplies for the Oregon State Penitentiary for the period ending December 31, 1907.

Sealed bids for drugs, drygoods, groceries, butter, leather and findings, hardware, flour and meat, etc., will be received in the office of the superintendent of the State Penitentiary, until Wednesday, June 12th, at 2 o'clock p. m., at which time they will be opened.

A deposit of \$200 in cash or certified check, payable to the superintendent, must accompany each bid for meat and flour, and all other bids must be accompanied by an amount equal to 10 per cent of the amount of the bid.

Samples to accompany all bids, where practicable. The right is reserved to reject any and all bids and to accept or reject any portion of a bid. On each envelope should be inscribed the nature of the bid. Goods of Oregon manufacture or production will receive preference, other things being equal.

All goods and supplies must be delivered to the penitentiary within twenty days after the contract is awarded.

Schedules of the various lines of goods to be bid on will be furnished upon application to the superintendent.

Vouchers will be issued for payment on the first of the month following the completion of the contract, and monthly on continuous contract.
