They opened the house on September 1 with "A Society Circus," which had been the attraction in the previous season, but on November 28 they produced "Pioneer Days" and "Neptune's Daughter." These two spectacles met with astonishing success, and have continued for twenty-three weeks to fill the mammoth Hippodrome. The most striking novelty was in "Neptune's Daughter," in which the huge tank was utilized to introduce a dozen young ladies who appeared as mermaids.
