THIRTEENTH ANNUAL CONFERENCE

Held For the International Peace Arbitration.

Lake Mohonk, N. C., May 22.

The thirteenth annual convention of the Lake Mohonk conference on international arbitration is held here today on the invitation of Mr. Albert Smiley from today till and including the 24th. The conference has commanded a large attendance, and is presided over by President Butler, of Columbia university, recently elected president of the American branch of the International Conciliation association. Coming so closely after the national arbitration and peace congress just closed in New York, this conference will devote much time to the primal object of that gathering, the consideration of subjects for discussion by the coming Hague conference. It is expected that Dr. Andrew D. White, a member of the first Hague conference and formerly ambassador to Germany, will speak on this topic, and an address is hoped for from Judge George Gray, of Delaware, a member of the permanent court of the Hague. Chief Justice Simeon E. Baldwin, of Connecticut, and the Hon. Bartlett Tripp, of South Dakota, will also speak. In recognition of the increase in interest shown throughout Latin-America in the subject of international arbitration, addresses will be delivered by Senor Enrique C. Creel, the new Mexican ambassador; Senor Calderon, minister from Bolivia; the Hon. John Bartlett, formerly minister to Columbia and now director of the international bureau of American republics, and the Hon. Francis B. Loomis, ex-assistant secretary of state. Senor Epifanio Porcia, minister from the Argentine republic, and Senor Cortes, minister from Columbia, are also present. Among the other prominent speakers will be Hon. Richard Bartholdt, member of congress from Missouri and head of the American group of the inter-parliamentary union; Dr. Benjamin F. Truegood of Boston, secretary of the American Peace society; Dr. E. E. Brown, United States commissioner of education, and Dr. Andrew S. Draper, New York state commissioner of education.

Prominence will be given to discussions, by leading educators, of the ways and means by which increased attention to and study of international arbitration and related topics may be brought about among undergraduates in colleges and universities. About 150 colleges and universities have already taken some action along these lines. Among the leading educators who have accepted invitations to make addresses are President Eliot, Harvard university; Angell, of Michigan; Thwing, of Western Reserve; Penny, of Washington; Lee; Needham, of George Washington; Rhees, of Rochester; Seelye, of Smith; Wright, of Clark; Taylor, of Vassar; Professors Peale, of Harvard; Reinsech and Ely, of Wisconsin; Moore and Clark, of Columbia; Mitchell, of Richmond, and Colby, of Dartmouth.

Following is from the opening address of the president:

address of the presiding officer, Dr. Nicholas Murray Butler:

This conference reassembles at an auspicious moment. Our country is still ringing with the echoes of the lofty sentiments and noble ideals which found expression before thousands of attentive auditors at the National Arbitration and Peace congress held in New York a month ago.

High officers of government and leaders of public opinion at home and abroad there united in giving voice to sentiments which mean, if they mean anything, that a new era is dawning in the moral history of mankind. However, before another month has passed, more than two score nations will assemble at the Hague to constitute a second international conference called in the interest of international peace.

Whether we look backward or forward, therefore, we see only signs of good omen.

Like an individual, a nation has a mind and a conscience, and it has them in a very real sense. As politicians and statesmen have long since found out, the terms Puritan conscience in America, non-conformist conscience in England, French spirit and German idealism on the Continent, are not names for empty abstractions, but they stand in each case for what is terribly real. One of the chief problems of our time is to bring the nations' minds and the nations' conscience to bear on the moral problems involved in international relations. This is a step in the moral education of the world.

It carries with it no necessary criticism upon what has gone before and no aspersion upon what now exists, any more than the full fruits reflects discredit upon the seed from which it sprang. The more perfect and complete morality of the future is itself to be the product of the incomplete and imperfect, but always improving, morality of the past and of the present.

There are good and earnest men who now and then express the fear that righteousness and peace may somehow or other come into conflict. This judgment appears to me to be based upon a study of the conditions which have prevailed in the past, rather than upon an appreciation of the forces that are indicated to rule the future. Not every judgment of a judicial tribunal, however learned and disinterested its members, brings complete satisfaction to both litigants, or even to the public at large; yet the overwhelming majority of judicial decisions are equitable and do give satisfaction to the public. Cannot the same be said of the judicial settlement of differences between nations instead of individuals? Or, if it cannot be said, then what assurance have we, if force be resorted to, that the cause of righteousness will prevail in the struggle? Will not "God be on the side of the heaviest battalions," as Voltaire cynically said? If so, then the cause of righteousness has not been advanced by going to war, unless it can be supposed to be advanced by the mere struggle on its behalf. But if this be true, why should the struggle on behalf of righteousness take the brute form of physical exertion, rather than the truly human form of moral endeavor? The truth is that fighting is an animal appetite, and, excuse it as we may, moral beings must treat it as they treat other animal appetites and subject it to rational control.

It is difficult, therefore, to see what real ground there is for supposing that righteousness and peace can come into conflict when those who seek righteousness are moral persons. If they be not moral persons, collective or individual, then what concept can they possibly have of righteousness? So long as human nature remains human, the several nations will each require their systems of police, and the world at large will require an international police; but this international police, while constituted of armies and navies, will, when it comes, be constituted in a way and from a point of view quite different from armies and navies maintained for offensive war.

From the forthcoming Hague conference we should ask, I think, chiefly two things, and if either of them should be given us, a long step forward would be taken.

1. We should ask that the per-

manent Hague court be transformed from a semi-diplomatic into a truly judicial tribunal. We should ask that judges be substituted for arbitrators. We wish to see a permanent international court, which, like our United States supreme court, will have a status, a procedure, traditions and precedents of its own. We wish to see international law declared as well as individual differences composed.

The present Hague court is in reality only an eligible list from which two litigants may choose those to whom they will submit their cause. In its stead I should like to see a permanent body of judges chosen for long terms or for life, paid suitable salaries, and as independent of the nations from which they are chosen as members of the United States supreme court are of the President who appoints or the senate who confirms them.

Some concern is expressed as to how the findings of this court would be enforced. Are we not justified in believing that the moral sense of the civilized world would enforce them in ninety-nine cases out of a hundred? For the extreme hundredth case or disobedience an international police would be needed. That, however, many of us regard as a remote possibility.

3. We should ask that the Hague conference, now assembling for the second time at the call of a monarch, be made to assemble automatically hereafter at regular intervals, say once in four or five years. So important an assembling of the nations should be independent of the will of any ruler, executive or parliament. The Third Pan-American conference made provision for the periodic assembling hereafter of representatives appointed by all the American governments. The second Hague conference should take similar action in its sphere.

Draining Swamp Lands.
Washington, D. C., May 22.—A general movement is in progress to redeem land from the water by a wholesale drainage of swamp lands, which in the whole country amounts to a very large acreage. It being estimated that over 50,000,000 acres in the United States can be redeemed and made fit for farming. States as large as Ohio, Indiana and Illinois combined lie today under water, and can be put into tillage by a scientific, thorough drainage system. The swamp lands in the continental United States, east of the Rocky mountains, susceptible of reclamation by drainage, have a total area just about that of the three great middle states named. According to government surveys and estimates there are at least 50,000,000 acres of land which can be drained and made fit for farming at a cost of about \$5 per acre. This would increase the value of the drainage districts more than \$5,000,000,000, and would add to the crop values of this great nation many millions annually. It is impossible to treat of the subject of the drainage of the wet and overflowed lands of the United States except to discuss it in millions and billions of dollars. So far the government has spent about \$35,000,000 in irrigation work, and the people have given unanimous approval to the project.

Selected School Land.
Oswald West, of the Oregon railway commission, has returned from a business trip to Washington. In part, his mission to the national capital concerned the selection of 100,000 acres of land for the state in lieu of a similar amount of school land taken into the forest reserve.
