Dr. John McLoughlin.

In connection with the recent laying of the cornerstone of the McLoughlin Institute at Oregon City, the Star has the following brief story concerning Dr. McLoughlin in whose memory the building is erected:

Dr. John McLoughlin was born at Riviere du Loup, Canada, October 19, 1784. His father was of Irish and his mother (nee Angelique Fraser) was of Scotch descent. The boy entered the services of the Northwest company when 16 years of age. He afterwards went to Scotland and later to Paris to perfect his education, especially in medicine. He succeeded Alexander Mackenzie as chief factor of the Northwest company, and when that company amalgamated with the Hudson Bay he was made chief factor of the new company, his territory extending over the whole northwestern part of the American continent. He built the post at Vancouver as the natural strategic trading center in 1824, and for many years conducted an immense business in furs. During his management over \$2,000,000 worth of furs were sent from Vancouver to the London market. He early

recognized the advantages of the town site by the falls of the Willamette and he located here and laid out some town lots. He built a mill, and in other things showed wonderful prescience of the future. He was the best friend the first settlers from the eastern states had and he went down into his pockets to the extent of thousands of dollars to help the destitute immigrants at the end of their six months' toilsome journey over plains, mountains and deserts.

Dr. McLoughlin married the widow of Alexander Mackenzie while stationed at Fort William near Lake Superior. After her death he married a full blooded Indian woman at Fort William. She bore him four children and he had one child by his first wife.

Dr. McLoughlin died in this city on September 3, 1857, and was buried in St. John's first graveyard alongside the church where he had often worshipped. A humble stone above his grave bears the inscription, "Friend and Pioneer of Oregon and also Founder of this City."

His Indian wife survived him two and a half years and then she was laid alongside her knightly husband. Dr. John McLoughlin was a remarkable man, a veritable prince among men. His outward appearance was remarkable. He was nearly six and a half feet in height, shoulders very broad, full chest and erect carriage. He wore quaint and courtly dress, and his hair, which had early turned white, fell in long silvery locks to his shoulders. Among the Indians he was known as the "White Headed Chief," or the "White Headed Eagle."

The institution of learning, the cornerstone of which will be laid tomorrow, is the first memorial erected in the honor of this great man. On his grave a marble slab, in the church a memorial window, in the senate chamber at the capitol in Salem his portrait in oil—neither less nor more!

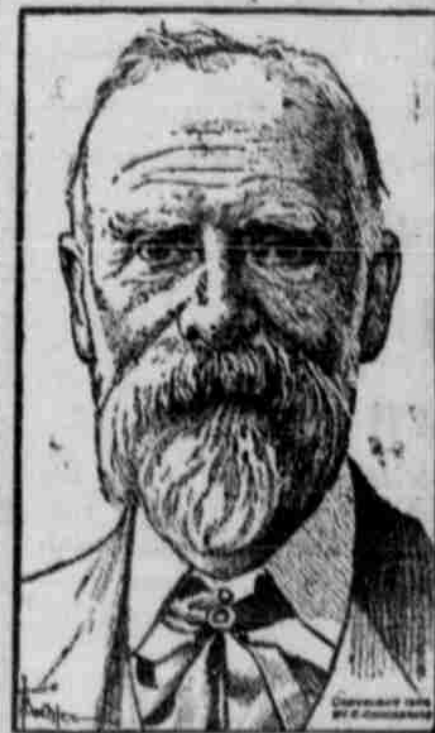

General Hop Report.

There has been little if any noticeable change in the situation the past week. Buyers and sellers are still apart in their views. Stocks in New York are said to be small and are held from 1/4c to 1c above buyers' views. On the Pacific coast poor grades can be bought quite readily at 5c to 6c, but the better grades are firmly held, and we hear of a few small sales around 7c to 7 1/2c for the better grades. The weather still continues very unseasonable, and in consequence the yards are very backward. Reports from the coast, however, agree that all indications are for a large crop, as the roots have wintered exceedingly well, and the yards are very healthy. Warmer weather would cause the vine to shoot up rapidly. The same condi-

tions are noted in New York state, except that there is considerable complaint of winter-killed roots in the old yards. Some sales are reported in New York state at from 12 to 14 cents, but the lots changing hands were very small. Some contracting is reported both from California and Oregon on the basis of 10c to 10 1/4c to farmers.

EUGENE'S NEW ORDINANCE.**Declares All Places Where Liquors Are Sold Public Nuisances.**

The Eugene ordinance passed by the Eugene council having been knocked out by the courts, a new ordinance was passed last Saturday evening, which, it is thought, will stand the test of the courts. It is quite stringent, and every place in the city limits, where intoxicating liquors are sold, bartered or given away, or where idle or dissolute persons are permitted to congregate for the purpose of drinking intoxicating liquors as a beverage, is declared to be a public nuisance. Provision is made by which, upon the filing of complaint, properly sworn to, the police are authorized to search such premises and to knock down doors, etc., if necessary, and when permission to enter is refused.
