OVERALLS WAR IS MERCILESS.

Two Firms Are Both Underselling Each Other.

That the male population of Pendleton will soon be clothed in overalls is probable if the merry war which is now being waged between Kahn Bros. and the Workmen's Clothing company continues.

The fight started when Kahn Bros. opened up a sale of clothing at reduced prices in a temporary store just south of the Rader furniture store. The proprietor of the Workmen's store immediately met competition by selling overalls for 65 cents. Kahn came back at him with a price of 33 cents. This was followed by a drop to 30 cents on the part of Louis Moses, of the Workmen's store. Kahn Bros. made a feint and rushed the rope for 29 cents. Moses got busy and landed a good blow with a large sign calling attention to 25 cents overalls. The response was an undercut for 23 cents. Things got warm by this time and the front of both stores were placarded with signs and knock-out drops were administered by Moses at a 20, 15 and 12 cent rate with the punching quickly returned by Kahn to the tune of 19, 14 and 11 cents.

A solar plexus blow was then attempted by Moses with an announcement of 3 cents pants, but Kahn crowded him to the ropes with a free pair with every 95 cent purchase. Both contestants are now panting for breath, while the store is filled with eager buyers.—East Oregonian.

SPECIAL MEETING OF COUNCIL

State Street Paving Is Again Held Up for Ten Days

The city fathers held a special meeting of the council last evening and transacted considerable business although the question of street paving in which most interest is shown was not definitely settled. According to Alderman Downing's report the work of paving State street will be delayed another ten days so far as any action of the Portland General Electric is concerned. A conference was held between Rollin K. Page and a committee composed of Mayor Rogers and Alderman Downing and Stockton last Saturday at which meeting said Mr. Downing "we agreed to give the company another week in which to take the matter under consideration and it is believed that the company will be able to give its decision on the proposition of paving between the rails of its track on State street at the next meeting of the city council.

In City Attorney Condit's report on the matter of the city wrongfully collecting taxes from C. H. Wheeler, a decision was given that the city recorder be instructed to refund \$2.88 to Mr. Wheeler as the property levied upon is not within the corporate limits.

The attorney also held in an opinion relating to the alley in block 44 between the properties of G. Sherwood and W. Skipton was dedicated to the use of the public. Attorney Condit and the city attorney also reported favorably on the opening of the west end of Bush streets in Owens addition.

Alderman Radcliff introduced a resolution requesting the health officer to report to the council each month the sanitary conditions of the city. The motion for the adoption was unanimously carried.

The second ward aldermen were given power to investigate the boundary line of Twelfth street between Mission street and Mill creek. The property owners on Twelfth street have petitioned the council to fix definitely the boundary lines of the street so that improvements may be made.

The question whether the city should provide it's own conveyance for carrying coal to a fire or pay the Yankee stable \$1 for the service of hauling the coal to each fire brought forth quite a discussion. Several of the councilmen thought that the present method was cheap and legitimate. The matter was referred to the committee on fire and water.

An agreement has existed for some time between C. W. Yanke and the city that Mr. Yanke furnish the fire department with coal for the consideration of \$1 for each fire. Where the fire requires several sacks of coal the price of hauling will be the same as if one sack was used.

Claud Jones Released.

Claud Jones, who was yesterday arrested by Deputy William Esch upon a complaint of a resident of East Salem charging insanity has been released, as his father appearing and promising to take care of his son.

The young man lives on East State street and recently took up quarters with some horse traders who were camped in East Salem. His peculiar actions while there caused the arrest.

J. M. Long Sues Fred Loose.

J. M. Long began an action in Justice Webster's court today against Fred Loose to obtain a judgment for \$32.50 as commission on the sale of certain real estate. Mr. Loose claims that he individually made the sale while the plaintiff claims that as the property was listed with him and he had been to some expense in trying to make that sale he should be entitled to the commission. The case is being heard this afternoon.
