VISIT DEAF MUTE SCHOOL

Progress Made In Teaching the Mutes to Speak

A splendid audience greeted the closing exercises at the Oregon Deaf Mute school Tuesday, including many of the parents of students and Salem people. The rooms were beautifully decorated with flowers and national colors and a beautiful flag drill was executed. The rooms were filled with displays of needlework, handwork and drawings of the children.

Superintendent Tillingshast thanked the visitors for their presence and encouragement offered the teachers and children. The latter were going to their homes to meet their parents.

The most important mode of education was the training of character in childhood. Education without character was a detriment sometimes.

For the first time the pupils had full year of drawing and sewing the girls. The boys did carpenter work and shoe making. The program was short, lasting forty minutes, two graduates receiving diplomas at the hands of Governor Chamberlain. They are going to Gallander college, Washington, D. C., where several Oregon graduates have gone.

The large class in oral and expression recited in concert and provided that great progress has been made teaching the mutes to speak. The play of one of the graduates was quite clearly to the delight of the audience. The patience and skill for instruction of the teachers to awaken the dormant powers of which is something remarkable. It is doubtful whether it is appreciated by parents or public.

The delicate recitations by the pupils in costumes were very effective and revealed a line of dramatic art which the deaf mutes seem to be peculiarly fitted. They are gifted in action and expression.

Governor Chamberlain addressed the graduating class and gave the honors to the graduates. He congratulated the faithful workers in the institution as having achieved results. The care of these children was a great responsibility of the citizens and tax payers of Oregon could appreciate what was

being done here in taking these children in their undeveloped condition and presenting them to society as completed men and women. The Governor then presented the diplomas to the graduates, Miss Lotus Valentine of Dallas and Harry Gardner of Plainview, Ore.

The oral teachers are Miss Nellie Nichol, Miss Lucille Cooper, Miss Clara Cooper, and Miss Edna Shomber. The manual teachers are Mr. Lindstrom and Miss Halse. Mrs. Tillingshast is matron. Miss Pearl Eggee is sewing teacher, and Miss Elfre Lenbo is art teacher.

Most of the children had their trunks packed and departed for their summer vacations. The enrollment the past year has been about 75 students.

COLLEGE MEET THURSDAY.

U. of O. Track Team Will Take Part in the Contest.

The Oregon track team will take part in the big triangular meet which is to be pulled off Thursday afternoon at Seattle.

For the most part the team is in the pink of condition. The two recent meets has left no bad effects, but on the other hand has tested the men and given them experience and confidence which will aid them in bettering their previous records. Manager McCarty is taking the team early so as to give the men ample time to recuperate from any evil effects of the long trip, which might occur. The team will stay in Seattle Friday to witness the regatta between Stanford and Washington. They will return home Sunday evening.

The meet next Thursday will in all probability be a repetition as far as scores go to the two previous meets of the year. Oregon has this year perhaps the strongest collegiate track team ever put out in the Northwest. None of the other colleges can come within shooting distance of her when it comes to a meet, although in some events she is woefully weak. The team might be said to be a little one-sided. At Seattle as with Pullman and O. A. C., Oregon will very likely have to be satisfied in the distances with one second and perhaps a couple of thirds. But in the weights, sprints and hurdles Kelly, Moores, Kuykendall, McKinney, Zacharias and Hug can be depended upon to bring these home.

Captain Moores has the comparative strength of the three teams figured out something like this. Idaho is especially strong in the distances, and Washington will win the pole vault, and they have first-class men for the high jump and high hurdles. As a conservative estimate Captain Moores says his men will bring home 65 points, leaving 61 to be divided between Washington and Idaho.

The men who go to Washington, besides Manager McCarty and Trainer Hayward, are Captain Moores, Kelly, Huston, Oberbauer, Hug, Zacharias, McKinney, Moulien, Kuykendall, Reid, Woods and Dodson.

The Washington meet is the last of the year. A meet with Whitman, for which Manager McCarty negotiated for some time, has been given up for this year.—Eugene Guard.

Stone-Blind Boys at Foot Ball.

"A dozen questions have probably occurred to the reader," writes Stanley Johnson, author of the article. "How do they know who has the ball? They do know; they are absolutely certain; they always tackle the right man. They themselves say they know it because the feet of the man carrying the ball strike the ground with a shorter, sharper, more intense blow than the feet of the interferers, and they dive unerringly for that sound. Certain seeing players have the knack of telling what opponent is going to carry the ball before the play begins by the way he plants his feet. It does not seem incredible, then, that blind players can locate him by the sound of his running. How they get under the ball on the kick-off and on punts is another question. As a matter of fact, they are not successful in getting under kicks. With the exception of certain of the back field, who have partial sight—and they only on very bright days—they make no effort to catch the ball. They wait till it strikes the ground and then spring for it guided by the faint swish the pigskin makes as it goes through the air. A football is one of the most perverse of all inanimate objects when it bounds, owing to its shape, and it would seem as though the seeing players had an immense advantage in capturing it. Yet that faint swish is to the blind boys almost what eyesight is to their opponents, and though they doubtless dread a punting game, their record does not show that it has spelled disaster for them."
