NURSERY ASSOCIATION MEETING

The fifth annual meeting of the Pacific Coast Nurserymen's Association will be held at Salem, Oregon, July 10, 11 and 12, 1907, in connection with the Salem cherry fair (under the auspices of the Marion County Horticultural Society). There will be present at this meeting F. A. Huntley, commissioner of horticulture of the state of Washington; W. K. Newell, president, and H. M. Williamson, secretary of the Oregon State Board of Horticulture; H. C. Atwell, president, and E. R. Lake, secretary of the Oregon State Horticultural Society; John Isaac, secretary, and probably Edward M. Ehrhorn, deputy commissioner of the California Horticultural Commission; C. I. Lewis, horticulturist, and A. B. Cordley, entomologist, from the State Agricultural College at Corvallis, besides a large attendance of nurserymen, seedmen, inspectors and fruit growers. This promises to be one of the most interesting meetings we have ever held, and there will be the finest display of cherries ever shown on the Pacific coast, as a large number of silver cups have been offered as premiums.

ADD A FEW FLOWERS.

Soldiers' Graves Should Be Remembered by Everybody.

It is comparatively but a short time since Memorial Day has been generally observed, and yet in that brief period the character of those observances have undergone a decided change. From being originally a day set apart to decorating the graves of those who fell in the defense of the flag, it very naturally became extended in its scope, until it is now a day upon which all graves are decorated. Indeed this has become so universal that the original intent of the day is, if not lost sight of, at least made a secondary matter. While the graves of the old soldiers are not neglected, and each receives its small quota of flowers from the committee of the G. A. R. and other bodies, still it is true that, while the day was first devoted to decorating soldiers' graves, now such a profusion of flowers are brought by families in memory of their own dead, that the soldiers' graves are conspicuous as being the most sparingly decorated with flowers. The strewing of flowers on the graves of the loved ones is a beautiful custom, and surely none can find fault with it, and yet it might be well for all who thus remember their dead, to take an additional flower or two to adorn the graves marked with our country's flag. Think of it, and then add each your mite of blossoms.

Program for Memorial Day.

Members of the G. A. R. and all other veterans are required to meet promptly at 1 o'clock at the post room, corner of Commercial and Center streets, to form for parade.

The parade will form in the following order:

1. Band.
2. Company "M," O. N. G.
3. Members of the G. A. R. and all other veterans.
4. Women's Relief Corps.
5. Ladies of the Ladies of the Grand Army.
6. Civic societies, schools and citizens.

The parade will start promptly at 2 o'clock and march to the intersection of Ferry street, where the veterans and Women's Relief Corps and Ladies of the Grand Army will take cars for the cemetery.

As they leave the cars at the cemetery they will reform in the same order as before and march to the G. A. R. circle in City View cemetery where the ritualistic services of the G. A. R. and W. R. C. will be observed.

Col. L. K. Page will be marshal of the day, and will be respected as such.

Memorial Day at Salem.

Postoffice hours for Memorial Day, May 30th: General delivery, stamp, registry and carriers' windows open from 8 to 9 a. m.

City carriers will make morning delivery in the business district. There will be no delivery by rural carriers and no money order business transacted.

Banks and all public offices will close all day. Stores will close at noon.

injury to stacks of valuable fabrics displayed in all the departments. There was too much water to save much of anything, and the best work was done protecting against water. The citizens worked in the most heroic manner, all the big dry goods houses of the city adding to the volunteer brigade. At no fire did there more prominent citizens take hold, and the city and county and state officials were represented. Mayor Rodgers was at the fire in a few minutes after the alarm, and with Chairman Walt Low did good service. The hydrant service was excellent, but the engine was a quarter of an hour getting pressure.

At the Worst Hour.

The flames broke out in the millinery department, and at the very worst time of the day, when nearly everyone was at lunch. Miss Evans was in the midst of it, and was finally carried to her rooms prostrate. Neither she nor her girls know how the fire started, or just where, and all efforts at interviewing them was fruitless. There are the usual rumors of an exploding gasoline stove, but without foundation. The millinery department was full of inflammable material, and might have been ignited in a hundred different ways. All things considered, it is remarkable that the building and so much of the stock was saved, and the work done by the fire department was, on the whole, very creditable, excepting the delayed engine, which was evidently left without steam, or the steam was let go down over the noon hour. That the whole block was not destroyed is wonderful.

Estimated Damage.

The damage to the building at this time cannot be estimated. It is owned by E. P. McCornack, who will at once rebuild it. It is insured. The stock of Jos. Meyers & Sons' is estimated by the owners at from \$75,000 to \$100,000. Other details are not known at present. The loss to the Masonic lodges is from \$2500 to \$3000. Both insured.

Business Will Continue.

Jos. Meyers & Sons' department store will continue business, and all clerks and employees are requested to report for duty on Friday morning, when the store will reopen, and the damaged stock will be sold off, and all departments will be in running order. All destroyed stock will be replaced, and the firm does not propose to let their trade suffer any inconvenience, if possible. They wish to thank the fire department, and all the citizens who responded so promptly, and did such effective work in saving their property from complete destruction.

Former Fires.

A crossed wire a few years ago caused a destructive fire in the show windows on the first floor. When the building was originally built as the Reed opera house and hotel, a fire destroyed the west end, the same fire bell that gave the alarm today being then sounded for the first time.

A large part of the third story was used by the Masonic fraternity for lodge purposes, the hall being one of the finest in the state. Here the furniture, draperies, etc., together with a fine piano and organ were

State Board of Forestry.

An act of the last legislature creates a state board of forestry, to be composed of the governor, secretary of State, state forest warden, and the forest official of the state agricultural college, and three electors recommended as follows: E. P. Sheldon, Portland, by Forestry association; Leonidas Hill, Eugene, by State Lumbermen's association; and Meut. Bartrum of the U. S. forestry service. The latter appointments were made by the governor in accordance with the terms of the Bingham bill. The new board is called to meet at Salem next Wednesday at 2 p. m.
