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AURORA SCHOOL EXERCISES

Aurora, Or., May 28.—The commencement exercises of the White School, district No. 38, Marion county, at Armory hall, Hubbard, Friday evening, May 31st, promise to be the most interesting ever held by a country school in the state, a perusal of the program will show. Cutting Affray at Camas Valley.
In a fight yesterday at Camas Valley between "Bud" Martindale and Frank Smith the former received a knife wound in the back cutting a gash nineteen inches long and about two inches deep for the entire distance, making it necessary for Dr. Hoover, who was called to attend the young man, to make thirty-one stitches to close the wound which was fully four inches in width at the center of the cut. Smith had been drinking some and was in a quarrelsome mood, having had a number of fights before meeting Martindale. It is supposed Smith used a razor or some other keen-edged instrument on his victim, as the blade went through Martindale's coat and suspenders and underclothes making a frightful gash. Martindale's father took out after Smith with a gun, but was overtaken by parties before he reached his son's assailant. No warrant has been issued for Smith, but he will likely be arrested. It is reported here today that he left the valley and his whereabouts are unknown.

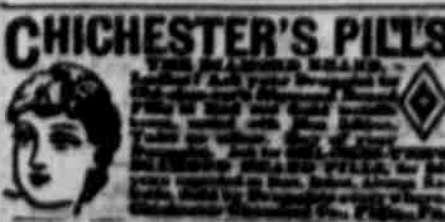
