Over fifty endeavorers and their friends were present and games and songs were enjoyed around the embers of a campfire till a late hour. During the evening an elegant spread containing pabulum from Boston baked beans to feathery angel food was served.

### Origin of London's Bohemian Club

About the end of the year 1885 bohemians who affected clean shirts and evening dress, and spent a good deal of money, whether earned or inherited, were very much to the fore. The Galaty was their particular playhouse, and they worshiped Connie Gilchrist and Nellie Farron rather than Henry Irving. They danced a good deal at subscription balls, took stalls at the theatres devoted to musical pieces by the year, and made Romano's their headquarters for luncheons, dinners and suppers. This was the old Romano's, a narrow bar and room with an aquarium in the front window at one end, and an evil smelling kitchen at the other. Only half a dozen tables, but the cooking was first rate, and the company delightfully mixed.

On almost any night at some time or other you would see the late Duke of Beaufort eating a cutlet and chatting with a stockbroker. Reginald Shirley Brookes (Peter Blobs), the weekly recorder in the "Ping 'Un" of the doings of this gay Bohemia, W. F. Goldberg, (Shifter), his lieutenant, the late Duke of Manchester when he was "Kim" Mandeville, with an American accent and a "gun" in his hip pocket. Then there was Arthur Roberts at the height of his success and popularity. Mons. Marius, Hughle Drummond, ready with a speech at any moment, "Bier Rabbit," the late Marquess of Allessbury, when he was Saverake, looking very like a prosperous potman Jim Selby, "Dickie the Driver," and Bob Coster of the "Old Time" coach, and many more good fellows who have long since died or become pillars of the state and respectable.

Of the ladies who delighted in "Romano's Italiano's the Paradise in the Strand," a number adorn the peerage, but of the habitues pleasant memories will always cling to Bessie Bellwood and Sisters Learmar.

It was not natural that, although regular customers could, in the old days, sup at Romano's until long after closing hours, the bohemians of the period desired a later resort, where the licensing act did not apply. Some of them belonged to Pratt's, the Beefsteak, White's, the Turf, and so on, but they required a place where everyone would be welcome, provided he was a good fellow.

When, therefore, Mr. and Mrs. Fredericks, otherwise Fredericks and Julian, of the music halls, took the adjoining Cyder Cellars with the idea of making it a Bohemian club the scheme caught on, the first committee, as far as memory serves, including Shirley Brookes, Goldberg, James Davis (Owen Hall), Arthur Roberts, Walter Dickson, and the present writer.

The club was named the Adelphi, but it very soon became better known as the Spooferies. Membership, to good fellows, was easy, elections frequently taking place on the door mat; the stewed tripe was first rate and all went well until on an evil day the proprietor wanted to admit as members some ready-money bookmakers. The committee objected and were incontinently "fired" by the proprietor. Out of the ashes of the Spooferies sprang the Pelican Club, and almost simultaneously came the starting of the "Bat" newspaper—London Leader.
