BAPTISTS HAVE NEW PASTOR.

Rev. J. R. Comer, of Atchison, Kan., in Charge.

On Sunday the services at the Baptist church will be of unusual interest. Dr. J. A. W. Stewart, dean of the Theological Seminary at Rochester, N. Y., will preach, and incident to the introduction of Dr. J. R. Comer, who comes from a twelve years' pastorate at Atchison, Kansas, to begin similar services here, Dr. Stewart will preside and formally be in charge of the services of the day. New members may be received, and the Lord's Supper observed at the morning services, when all the members of the church who possibly can should be present. Dean Stewart is one of the leading men of the Baptist denomination and merits every deference. The people of Salem will do well to hear him. The morning services begin at 10:30. Sunday school at 12 m. B. Y. P. U. at 7 p. m., and preaching again at 8 p. m.

Shot and Then Robbed Him.

Two masked men visited the home of **Dr. Dan Dall**, who lives all alone in a small house near Eugene, Wednesday, for the purpose of robbery. Dall was in the house alone when the robbers roused him from his bed. When Dall refused to give up his money, or to reveal its hiding place one of the robbers shot him. The ball entered the shoulder, inflicting a severe wound but one not necessarily fatal. Dall is now in the hospital.

The alarm was given and the sheriff and citizens started in pursuit. So far no clue has been found. The robbers searched and found \$50.

Jefferson Fire Friday.

On Friday Jefferson had a narrow escape of being wiped out in part by fire, and demonstrated the need of water works. The fire caught in Schuyler's barn, just south of the Johnson & Voigt Lumber Company's barn. It spread to A. A. Miller's barn and the A. B. Cornelius barn. All three were destroyed. The Bert Miller residence, the Tucker hardware store and the old Ralph hotel were nearly consumed, but were saved by the efforts of the bucket brigade. A high wind raged and for a time half the town was in danger. The loss is small, but a splendid lesson has been taught the community to prepare for dangers.

A Coffee Mill Fire.

The fire department was called out this morning to the Yokohama Tea store, where an electric wire had gone wrong in connection with the motor on the coffee mill. The motor was short-circuited, and burned out the rheostat. The department responded very promptly, but no work was required, as there was nothing but some smoke from the burning wires.

The sailor plunged and splashed around under the ship's bows, blowing like a grampus, till the captain crawled out on the bowsprit and threw him a line. Then the watch hauled him aboard. It was a strangely befuddled sailor who shook the water out of his eyes, and asked where he was.
