JOURNAL'S FASHION LETTER

Gossip About Dress and Fancies of Artists in Gowns

Eyebled embroidery will remain in vogue just as long as its faithful adherents can keep it. Of all the needle work types it lends itself to the most lacy effects and is of all of them, the most universally popular. Few strikingly new patterns crop out in it from year to year, for past eras seem to have exhausted all of them that are desirable. Moreover just now, with the liking for things quaint, the traditional wheel and sprig patterns are right in order.

Voile is as popular this season as it has been for the two seasons past, and now it is not only the checked and striped variety, but we see a resurrection of the clan kind. The latter is often made up over figured lining; so the effect of the plain and the fancy materials are, in the end, about the same. Both the checked and striped voiles figure among the fancy sorts and the colors are of the unaggressive kind, usually combining several shades of the one color of a soft tone with white. Occasionally one sees a voile with an embroidered dot or other design upon ground of delicate one-shade or two-shade or striped. The new plain voiles are finished in beautiful borders, and these can be made up most artistically, with panels or folds on the skirt and with fichu, draped yoke effect or bolero trimming on the corsage.

A pretty touch is given to a trig little tailor-made of pale gray by the fastening of the coat. The garment is held across the front by velvet loops through which threads a pale blue ribbon scarf. The mushroom hat of natural colored straw has a big bow which exactly matches this scarf. The bow and scarf are arranged so to be easily taken off and before this suit goes to the country for the season there are to be two other sets, one in black and the other in rose color to give variety to a costume that is expected to give hard and long service.

Rubberized pongee is the thing for smart practical motor and traveling wraps. Outside garment is ordinary fine quality silk pongee in natural color. Inside is a coat of fine rubber that makes the material absolutely waterproof. The price is \$1.48 a yard.

The all-white frock is put in the back-ground somewhat by the tendency to give everything the touch of color. Some of the handsomest embroidered white gowns are trimmed with narrow bands of colored linen which appear on the hems of the skirts and on the coats. These colored bands are now and then striped with white to add to the complexity. Yellow, green, pink and blue are used in this way. The colored material often makes up the collar and cuffs on gowns that are otherwise plain. Right in line with the idea is the dainty fashion for embroidered collar and cuff sets of thin colored lawn worked with white and edged with tiny knife-plaitings of the materials. Sometimes these sets are plain but for the hemstitched edges or a sparkling of tiny embroidered dots. Narrow black taffeta scarfs are worn with the colors. The scarf of an attractive set seen lately passed through crocheted ring and ended in silk tassels.

The new long redingote is being made by the best houses and worn more every day by the fashionables. The material is gray linaige threaded with gray of a darker tone, cut both plain and on the bias. The skirt is made without a bit of stiffening about the hem—as has been the mode in finishing skirts for so many seasons, the aim being to produce a clinging appearance. A binding of velvet is put around the redingote and the revers are also of velvet, just below the shoulders in the back the fullness begins, finished both back and front with little curved pieces. The hat worn with the redingote is a real bell shape of heavy rice straw, white garnished

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with a band and big bow of black taffeta, with three huge colored roses at the side. A narrow bandeau is placed under the brim in the front to lift it slightly from the head. The veil is black point d'esprit, with a border of delicate black lace. The veil is cut to fit the hat and is made curved in the upper part, wider in the back than in the front. This is done so it may lie in pretty folds about the face, just the dress all around.

A trimming that is seen very much in millinery and has had great success is the very long and much curled ostrich feather, which begins at the right side of the crown of the hat and winds across the brim to the left side, there falling in a shower at the back of the hat. The narrow front and wide back brim make most of the big chapeau rather picturesque.

The passing of the high bandeau is a great point in favor of the new millinery. Never has there been a style more ungainly or unbecoming than the tilting of the hat to an alarming degree at one side, back of the head, and down over the brow. If it exists at all, the new bandeau is low, round, modest, and barely lifts the hat from the head and tilts it not at all. It is wound with a bit of illusion.

Styles for both hat and dress are undergoing a change already a very gradual one certainly but noticeable. Gowns are becoming more graceful the big shapeless Japanese sleeve is adjusting itself to the figure, and jackets and redingotes are less ample in size. Hats are getting to be less quaint and neater in appearance. But it is disappointing to say that there is no particular smartness about them as yet.

A new style in hats is reported and the manufacturers are trying to make it go. It is suggestive of the shepherdess shape made with a low oblong crown, and curved broad brim with a gentle sweep at the sides.

A word must be said of the new bathing suits seen recently. Many of the most attractive bathing suits have white pongee tights buttoning around the waist. There is a buttoned strap around the knee. The bathing suit skirt is made of blue, brown, cardinal or tan colored serge of pongee, strapped with white, and there is a wide white collar.

Many of the shortest bathing suits are made without the wide flapping white collar. The neck is finished with a pointed front and there is a Windsor tie knotted and drawn through a gold buckle or ring. Other necks are finished double breasted and piped with a contrasting color, and some of these are very smart indeed.

One of the new bathing suits is quite Empire in its tendencies. It is made of heavy washable silk and the skirt is plaited ar und the waist band to give it fullness. The blouse is rather short in the waist and there is a folded girdle of silk which is brought up very high in the back and pulled down very low in the front. This makes the suit particularly adapted to the slender woman's form.

To enjoy motoring thoroughly one must wear the right clothes for it. Every woman should have one hat in her outfit that will fit snugly under a motor veil, and an example of one seen the other day is good for all purposes. It was a continental hat of brown straw, with the left side brim caught up with roses, the roses shade from brown to ecru. A soft fold of brown silk encircles the brim.

The small sailor is conspicuous among the sailor hats. The favored models have the straight brim trimmed with a handsome wing mount at one side, the left usually. Other models are trimmed with a deep band of silk about the crown. Loops of ribbon and rose are placed at the left side. Milliners are showing close little turbans in all shapes, and matching in shade the motor coat, and with the motor hat goes the motor veil of chiffon shirred around the sides and back of the turban, and leaving the face exposed. The veil is usually the shade of the straw and sometimes a very sheer silk is used instead of the chiffon, answering the purpose of protecting the hair and neck, and wearing much better than the more flimsy material.

Motor hats and veils in black are very smart and are especially becoming to the slight fair woman with plenty of color, but they show the defects too plainly and easily to become as popular as their smartness might demand.
