CAMPAIGN TO BEGIN MONDAY

Business Men Will Raise \$1,000 for Y. M. C. A. Current Expense Fund

An aggressive campaign will be inaugurated Monday by 50 business men of this city to raise \$1,000 to pay the current expenses of the local Young Men's Christian Association. This promises to be one of the most systematic efforts ever put forth in the association's behalf, and will doubtless be met by a hearty response. The friends of the Y. M. C. A. have in the past given the worthy institution their liberal support, and not only will money be raised by the committee next week, but an earnest effort will be made to secure 100 new members. At a meeting at the Board of Trade rooms last night the five committees, composed of 50 of the prominent business men of Salem, agreed to spend at least three or four hours on Monday and Tuesday of next week working in the interests of the association. Lunch will be served at noon in the Y. M. C. A. building to the committee men on each of the days, when the work in hand will be discussed.
