## ANOTHER BIG DEAL.

Over Million for 220,000 Acres of Oregon Timber.

The largest timber land deal consummated in Oregon this year was Saturday in the purchase of 220,000 acres of timber at the head of the Nehalem river, \$1,050,000, by William H. White Company, of Farmington, Michigan. The land was the property of Wheeler & Cook, who purchased most of it from J. F. ...

The tract forms a part of townships 2 and 3 north, by ranges 6, 7 and 8 west, and is covered with a heavy growth of yellow fir, spruce, etc. Some of the sections transferred are not more than 20 acres from Portland on the tributaries of the Nehalem river known as the Leon and Trask rivers.

The new owners will hold for speculative purposes, as they have still a 10-years' cut in the Michigan woods and are therefore in no hurry to log their Oregon holdings. The William H. White Company is reputed to be worth \$10,000,000.

Daniel Clark, aged 41 years, has resided nine miles from Boise for 31 years, and is a farmer and stock-raiser. He was born in Missouri. He is a democrat, and an Odd Fellow.

George Powell, aged 58 years, is a farmer, and has resided near Boise 11 years. He has lived in Nebraska, Iowa and Oregon. He is a democrat and always has been, and belongs to no church nor lodge.

O. N. Sebern is 52 years old and lives on a ranch 12 miles from Boise. He came to Ada county a year and a half ago from Wyoming. He is republican in politics, but belongs to no church nor secret order.

H. F. Messecar, 52 years old, has been a farmer all his life and has lived 12 miles down the valley for 14 years. He was born in Canada and lived in South Dakota before coming to Idaho. He is a republican, and was formerly a Methodist.

J. A. Robertson, 71 years old, is a building contractor and builder and has resided in Boise 16 years. He has followed the trades of a blacksmith and painter. He is a republican, an Odd Fellow, and a Methodist. He was born in Scotland and lived in Canada 13 years and in Illinois 13 years.

Levi Smith, 53 years of age, is a resident of Boise, but formerly lived 11 miles down the valley. He has been a resident of Idaho 12 years, and most of that time he spent in farming, but recently has been in the employ of the Boise and Interurban Railway company, building fences. He is a republican, and K. of P.

A. P. Burns, 52 years old, has lived in Boise three years and in Ada county 19 years. He is not in business now, but was formerly a grocer, and by trade a carpenter. He was a member of the carpenters' union 14 years ago, and is a republican.

Samuel Russell is a farmer, has resided in Ada county seven years and was born in Pennsylvania, living in Illinois, Missouri, Iowa and Dakota before coming to Idaho. He is a prohibitionist, but was formerly a republican, and is a member of the Congregational church. Age 68 years.
