Chemawa Braves

The University of Oregon artists are too much for the Indians at Chemawa this morning, winning by a big margin of 8 to 2. Chemawa tried to make good against the fast and heavy hitting of the Eugene men. The Indians couldn't get in some of the long, twisting of Kelley, Paine and several of other U. of O. men, nor could they make good connections with the confusing deliveries.

Chemawa made a large number of errors, but it was generally conceded that they failed to come up to their usual standard in handling the other goods. Oregon got several free-baggers, and the fact that they had been well coached and trained could be seen in their artful sliding base stealing. The U. of O. score actually rose from the beginning of the game, adding a run almost every inning. Chemawa got their first run in the fifth, when Poland made a two-base hit that brought in Hurd on a close slide on home. In the eighth Teabo started for a steal on third, but it looked as though Hurd and Johnson had him safe between them, when Teabo scored Hurd's error. The Oregon men were putting out the real article in baseball this year, and it was plain their game from the first.

Hurd and Kelly make a strong battery, Kelley putting up a strong stop to Hurd's swift work.

"And you proposed to kill these men for two dollars a head?"

"I object," said Hawley, and was sustained by the court.

The defense excepted. Asked if he gave any consideration to the amount per head, the witness said no. He stated that Moyer, in addressing a meeting of the miners, counseled all miners in the strongest terms that they must refrain from violence. Haywood also made a speech warning the miners that they must keep out of saloons and refrain from drinking and gambling. If there was any violence, the federation would be blamed, and troops called.

He got into the mine to attempt the explosion, but was discovered by the cager, who shot at him, and he fled. He made the first attempt to blow up the mine in September and the second in November. He talked it over with the strike committee first, and said Sherman Parker gave him the idea of attaching a pistol to the guard rail, discharging it into the giant caps, thus causing the explosion. He also talked it over with William Easterly. At this point Richardson called Easterly, who will be a witness for the defense, and had him identified by the witness. "That is him," declared Orchard, for the first time displaying agitation or temper. When he planted a trap in the mine Easterly was not with him, as being an officer of the union, he wanted to be in a position to prove an alibi. He planted the bomb, but couldn't explain how he made the mistake of fastening it on the sixth level, which was unused, and not in the seventh, for which it was intended. He didn't know of his own knowledge if the bomb actually killed McCormick and Beck.

After the explosion he married Toney, a widow, with three children, under the name of Harry Orchard. He went to live at her house, which was 500 yards from the shaft of the Vindicator. He lived with her during the time he stayed in the district. He was broke when the two men were killed, so he went to see Davis and Parker, and asked him for money. They put him off, and he became angry. Before this, however, he had gone to Detective Scott, and told him an attempt was to be made to wreck a train. The reason he did this was because he hadn't been paid for the first Vindicator attempt. He didn't think he was used right by being sent into the mine to try to blow it up, and taking great risk, while the others were given the comparatively easy task of wrecking a train, which carried with it no risk.

"Were you angry because you were not told to wreck the train?" was asked. "Well, I suppose I was a little jealous," was the reply. This brought out another wrangle between counsel.

The extreme tension under which the court attaches are working was indicated this afternoon when the deputies made the spectators carrying umbrellas open them to show that no concealed weapons were being carried into the court room. A number of minor fist fights also took place between the deputies and too-eager spectators, but no material damage resulted. Richardson at once began the interrogation of Orchard as to the reason of his activities at Cripple Creek. He was anxious to show the jury that the witness went into the most of the crimes he committed because of his own desires, and not because any one asked him to. Orchard again insisted that the reason he squealed on the attempt to wreck the train with non-unionists aboard, was because Parker and Davis had gone over his head, and got two other men to try to wreck the train, when he wanted the job.

Portland, Or., June 7.—District Attorney Manning announced today he would rigidly enforce the Sunday closing law, put the lid on in the county and close every saloon.
