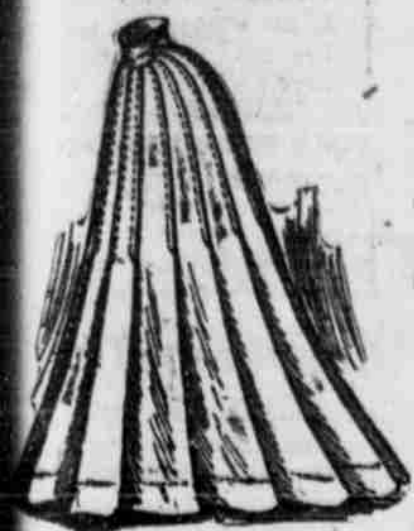

Thinks He Will Have to Visit Salem Again.

Leavings, Alberta, Canada.

May 30, 1907.

Editor Capital Journal: I find I cannot write to all those requested me to write to them, will do as some requested, write the Journal, and hope my friends excuse me for not writing them person.

I stopped over one day at Bellingham, Washington, and took in town, and with the balance I did the works of the Bellingham British Columbia Lumber Co. is one of the largest lumber in the world with an average of 500,000 feet a day.
