Asks Divorce—

Clara B. Ferguson has commenced divorce proceedings against Frank C. Ferguson. The complaint sets forth that the defendant and plaintiff were married in January, 1887. There were born to the marriage two children, Everett C. and Esther, aged 16 and 13 years, respectively. The plaintiff, in addition to a decree of divorce asks the custody of the two minor children, and such other relief as the court may deem necessary. Webster Holmes appears as the attorney for the plaintiff. Attorney Pogue appears for the defendant, and filed a demurrer. The case has been taken under advisement by Judge Galloway.

CIRCUIT COURT.

F. J. Eldridge vs. Hofer & Zorn
Case Was Dismissed.

The land suit of F. J. Eldridge vs. John Hofer and Caspar Zorn, which Judge Galloway has been hearing in the circuit court for the past two days, has been dismissed on the ground that there was no contract, and that if action was to have been taken Mrs. Laurel was the person to have begun suit. The claim made by Eldridge was that a contract was signed by himself, Zorn and Hofer to the effect that he was to have ten years in which to pay for the property in question. This contract, he claims, was destroyed in a building which was burned. Hofer and Zorn deny that the contract ever existed.

CLOSE GAME LOST TO "OREGON"

Two Errors Lose Game 3 to 2—Coach
Bezdeck Gets Sore—Bishop Gives
Team Sweater-Vests

The Salem high school team put up a surprise for the U. of O. bunch yesterday, when they had them buffaloed 2 to 1 until the eighth inning, when the visitors bunched in some hard hits, and on a couple of Salem's errors brought in two more runs, making the final score 3 to 2 for "Oregon."

The University men came to Salem yesterday, after beating the Indians 8 to 2, with the expectation of an easy game with the high school, but after their first lone run in the first inning and hardly ever seeing first after that until the eighth they began to get a little worried and put up the hardest kind of a scrap they could.

Coach Bezdeck became a little sore during the game when the umpire, Bishop, made him stop giving signals to his men from the bench and told him that if he wanted to coach to get on a suit. He seemed to be suffering a little mental agony until their "Oregon luck" in the eighth, when a relieved expression again overspread his face. Bezdeck claimed that he had a right to coach his men from the bench, but not so by the rule book, although it is done by many college teams.

The high school team played the game of their lives yesterday although they made a few more errors than usual, but the errors were few considering the difficult chances they accepted. Keene was more than a match for the visiting twirlers although they put Clifford in the box to relieve Beck in the seventh inning. Keene struck out 5 men to only 1 strike out by Beck and did not walk a man, to 3 walked by Beck and it was generally said among the "varsity" men that they could not find them in the way they were used to. Even "Dud" Clark failed to get in any of his phenomenal batting. Jones put up excellent backstop work for Keene and the whole team played the game. Captain Roberts at shortstop took a number of difficult ones although as something unusual he made 3 errors. The work of the fielders was good yesterday, especially Carey who gathered in 4 difficult ones although he made a bad error on a grounder in the eighth. In the sixth Dyer was put in Moore's position at right field and got a nice little hit which scored Jones.

For "Oregon," Kestley did excellent work in right field and Clark, who went to the bench with a sprained foot in the seventh gathered in everything at shortstop. Paine played an errorless game at first, and Hathaway, Johnson and Kesley also played a great game.

The Game.

"Oregon" went to bat and brought in their first run, which was not paid much attention to then by the crowd, as they had expected to see the university run up a score. In the last of the first the high school also got their first run. Roberts had walked to first and stole second and scored while Jones was being thrown out at first. In the third inning the high school looked as if they would score again. With bases full and one down, and the hard stickers up, but the fielders got the hits, and the side went out without scoring. The high school scored again in the sixth inning, giving them two runs to the visitors' one. Jones got a hit for first, and went to third on a wild throw over first when Dyer got his hit, bringing Jones over the plate. In the eighth Oregon relieved their suppressed feelings. With one down Clifford reached first on Robert's error. Smith singled and both scored when Carey failed to stop Ramp's double. Ramp was caught by a sprint by Kay between second and third. The ninth inning was short, neither team being able to score.

Have Engineers Out.

The special committee on water supply for the city of Salem, composed of Aldermen Haas, Radecliff and Low have entered into a contract with F. C. Kelsey, of Portland, for \$300, to make a survey and report on at least five available sources of water supply, together with cost of bringing into the city. Mr. Kelsey now has surveyors out, and the report will be ready to submit to the city council by the middle of July. It is the intention of the committee to make such a report as will furnish a basis for submitting to the voters at a special election a proposition to secure a public water works owned by the city, by means of a bond issue. If that cannot be done at present, they purpose to have the report on file for future effort in that line.
