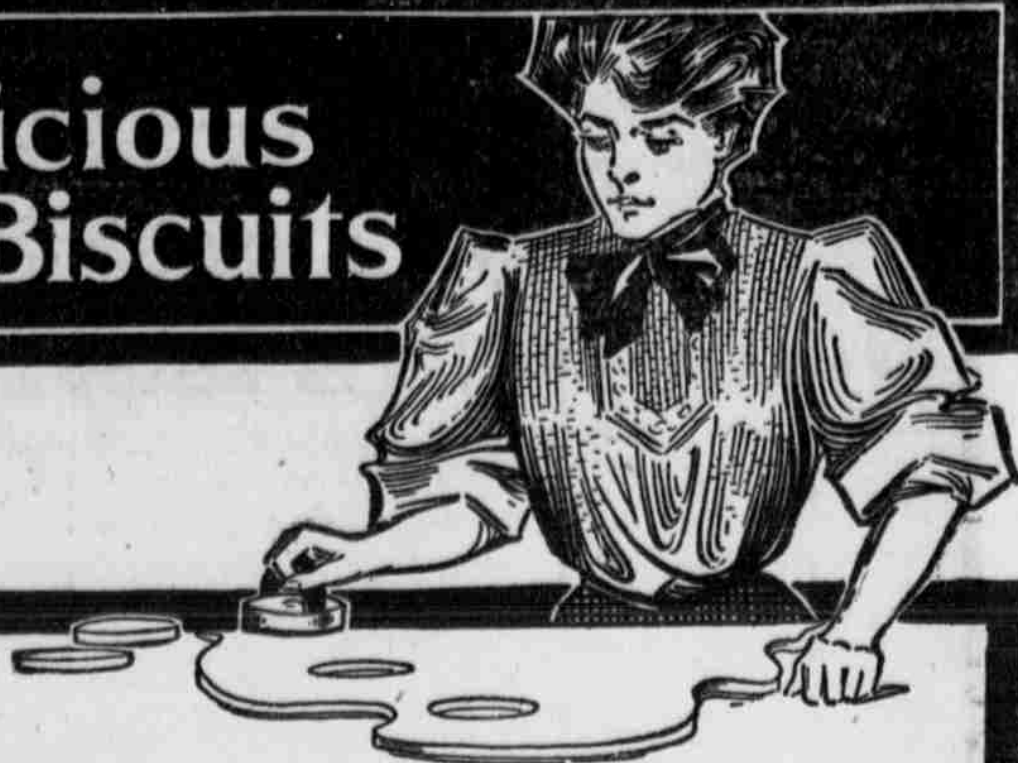

Bridge Will Soon Be Finished.

Work has been resumed on the concrete bridge on North Commercial street, and will be rushed to completion with due dispatch. Several teams and a large force of men are employed in tearing down the old bridge structure and making the fill on the south side of the arch. The gates of the mill race at Stayton will be closed for several days, which will shut the water out of Mill creek, and facilitate the construction work. As soon as the fifty-foot fill on either side of the arch is made the Capital Improvement Company will finish the work on the remaining fill.

Eugene Divinity School.

This office is in receipt of a catalog of the Eugene Divinity School of the Christian church for 1907-1908. It is open to young men and women on equal terms, and has its buildings adjacent to the campus of the State University. On the board of regents are such men as Hon. T. B. Kay, of Salem, and Hon. A. C. Jennings, of Lane county. Evangelist S. M. Martin gives special instruction in evangelistic work. The general educational work of the divinity school is carried on in connection with the University, and the catalog states that the courses of study are so arranged that some of the studies must be taken at the University. The studies of the four-year classical biblical course are selected from the University and Divinity school, and especially intended for those who look forward to the ministry as a life work. On page 7 of the catalog it is stated:

"The University department of Greek, under Professor John Straub, is so complete and thorough, including New Testament Greek, that it meets all our requirements in the divinity course. The same may be said of all the departments with which we have associated our course of study; such as the departments of history, Latin, mental science, literature, geology, philosophy, biology, sociology, etc."

Old Bridge Is Strong.

For about two years the viaduct across Commercial street has been under condemnation, as not being safe for big loads. The street car company has been hauling gravel across there, and the cars pass regularly, but many people have avoided the bridge, and many anxious husbands have cautioned their wives to cross that turbulent stream, known as South Mill creek by some other crossing. Now the matter has been definitely settled that the bridge will hold up almost anything, by Will Babcock moving a large frame house across Saturday night. The house weighs 40 or 50 tons, and the street car people put a car on the south side of the creek for fear the bridge would go down. But it did not, and henceforward and forever let it be known that the bridge publicly condemned and believed to be unsafe may carry a big load.

Three Lives Lost to Save One.

In an effort to rescue their co-laborers three loggers working on the Barber log drive at Krall's bar leaped into the swift current of the Boise river and were drowned, while the man to whose rescue they attempted to go was saved by his own efforts. The drowned are George Corack, an Australian, and Fernin Austabe and Francisco Yriondo, both Spaniards.

Many of the logs had piled up on the bar, which is about four miles above the headgate of the New York canal, and the loggers, all of whom were experienced men, were working them off into the current of the stream. The men had scarcely got warmed up to their work Monday morning when one of their number fell into the stream beside a log.

When he sunk out of sight five of the loggers jumped into the water to rescue him. Where the man fell the river is about 20 feet deep and very swift and turbulent. The loggers found that, instead of being able to assist their comrade, a fierce battle for their lives was facing them. They fought desperately, and many times struggled to the surface from beneath the muddy water which was sucking them down, each time being weaker than before.

One by one the men sank for the last time until three of them were gone. The man for whom they risked their lives caught the side of the log as he fell and after a short struggle, during which he passed under the log, pulled himself above the water and later succeeded in reaching the bank. Two of the others, weak and exhausted, also succeeded in reaching the bank.

The bodies have not been recovered.—Boise Statesman.

Great Oil Prospect at Dufur.

Mr. Andrew Shreve, of Pennsylvania, a noted geologist, has been in Dufur the past week, and has thoroughly investigated the oil region in this vicinity, and has decided upon the location of the first oil well in a gravel bed several hundred feet from the springs affected on W. H. Dufur's place. He has had experience in many regions, but before did he see such pure oil coming out of the ground. The contract has been let and the casing sent for the company expects to begin operations within the month. Oil has sold like wild fire, \$1.75 a barrel of shares were sold in one day. Finding of the silverware under warehouse there, taken from Jackson's store confirms the present belief that the fire was the work of a thief.
