Out Look For the Greatest Celebration in Salem's History

The various Fourth of July committees are enthusiastic and are getting the programs which are in their charge well outlined for the big celebration.

The committee on parade has planned for an elaborate spectacular, military and business parade. There will be floral designs, military displays and many handsome floats built by the business people of the city. There will probably be no march in the afternoon, but comic features will be contained in the big parade in the morning.

There will be at least five or six bands of music, including the Salem band, Summit, Victor Point and probably Monmouth, Woodburn and Reform school bands and others. There is nothing that would add more to the success of the occasion than good music, and from the present outlook those who attend Salem's Fourth of July celebration may hear the stirring music of patriotic airs and the intricate harmonies of the classic to their heart's content.

The committees ask that the citizens offer suggestions, and solicit individual displays in the parade. D. A. Dinsmore, chairman of the parade committee, said this morning: "We do not want the citizens to feel that this is a one-man or faction celebration. We, as committees, are enthusiastic and will, to the best of our ability, do every thing for the success of the celebration, and we will be thankful for suggestions from any one." As chairman of the parade committee, Mr. Dinsmore asks anyone wishing to furnish an individual display for the parade to see him or some of the committee on floats.
