Hunting the Golden Fleece.
Consult-General George Horton, returning from Athens, says that the increasing emigration from Greece has been the subject of considerable study and discussion among the legislators and statesmen of the country during the past year. He gives the following particulars:

Statistics vary greatly as to the number that have left the country during the past six months. It is estimated that the emigration fever has spread over the entire country, and it is almost impossible to find a young man or boy in the village or on the farms who does not live in the hope of getting away to America as soon as possible. There has been much talk of impending emigration legislation of some kind, and a committee was appointed by the chamber of Deputies to study the subject.

The report of this committee does not represent emigration as an unadvised evil. The Greek, it seems, never becomes attached to the country of his temporary adoption, but always in the hope of returning some day to his native land. For this reason he sends all the money he can save back to Greece for the purchase of land or other property, or for the paying off of mortgages. The director of posts and telegraphs, in his report to the committee mentioned, calls attention to the startling increase of late in the number of money orders sent from America to Greece. To establish this point he shows that the number in 1902 was 447, with a value of \$12,828; in 1904 there were 4477 orders, representing \$135,475; and in 1905 the orders numbered 10,007, with a value of \$334,848, while the money orders sent from Greece to America in 1905 numbered only 124, representing \$1466. I quote from the Greek Postmaster General's report, translated literally:

"If one estimates that one-eighth of the money sent from the United States (to Greece) comes in the form of postoffice orders, it is not too much to say, taking into consideration also the bank notes enclosed in envelopes and the checks upon London, that the entire sum amounts to more than 40,000,000 francs (\$7,719,000) a year. Scarcely a letter arrives from America that does not contain a sum of money, large or small."

It is this golden stream flowing into the country and trickling out to every village and hamlet that has excited the imaginations of the peasants and led them to believe that America is a country where gold can be picked up on the streets. Whether it is good for a country to lose its blood and sinew in this way, the lawmakers from the fields and vineyards, even though money is sent back, is a question for the legislators and statesmen to decide; whether immi-

grants whose only interest in America is to send money out of it and leave when they have acquired a certain sum are good for America or not is a question that does not particularly interest the Greek statesmen.

The report of the same committee gives the number of Greek emigrants to America between 1869 and 1905 inclusive, as 68,236. Up to 1897 the numbers emigrating were small, being only eight in the year 1869, and 57 in 1897. Nearly half of the entire number in America, according to the report, have gone over in the three years of 1903, 1904 and 1905, the numbers being, respectively, 14,030, 11,343 and 10,515. The fact that the emigration fever has finally broken out in earnest in Greece, however, is proven by the fact that between June 30, 1905, and June 30, 1906, 23,127 Greeks left this country for the United States.
