President Talks Like Others Who Never Run a Newspaper.

The president in his address to Congress at Jamestown Monday, said: "I do not intend to dwell upon my duties today, however, save that I shall permit myself to point out one matter where it seems to me that the need of our people is

essential that the man in public life and the man who writes in the public press shall both of them be good servants of the people, be prompt to assuage wrong and wickedness.

The second place be sure that you and avoid everything like hysteria or exaggeration; for to assume a decent man for something of which he is innocent is to give aid and comfort to every scoundrel, and indulgence in hysterical exaggeration serves to weaken, not strengthen the statement of truth. The third place be sure that you use your judgment on conduct and on the social or economic position of the individual with whom you are dealing. There are good men in every walk of life, and their being good or bad does not depend upon whether they have or do not have large bank accounts."

A HUGE ATLANTIC LINER

Registers 22,000 Gross Tons and Carries 4,000 Persons

On her maiden voyage, the huge Hamburg-American liner, President Lincoln, 22,000 gross tons, left Hamburg, Germany, for New York, a week ago. She has on board 2,923 passengers and a crew of 300. The passengers consist of 366 cabin and 2,557 steerage.

In many important respects the President Lincoln differs from the usual trans-Atlantic liners. She has six steel masts, a novelty in itself, and another striking feature is the isolated structure between the main and mizzen masts intended for the exclusive housing of the ship's officers.

Tourists the ocean over hitherto have been permitted to have more or less access to the quarters of the officers, but on the Lincoln all this has been done away with. The "tenement-house-like" structure is separated from the superstructure in which the cabin passengers are to be housed, by a considerably low area of space technically called a well, and across this space there will be no thoroughfare to passengers. This will assist the officers in the navigation of the ship without suggestions from passengers. A lofty bridge stands on the officers' skyscraper.

Vessel Has Moderate Speed.
The President Lincoln is not to be a flyer, as the "greyhounds" of the sea are usually called. Instead she is to be a bulky cargo and passenger carrier with a moderate speed of seventeen and a half miles. She has only one funnel and three of the masts stand forward of the smokestack and three others aft of it.

The Lincoln is to have a sister ship in the President Grant, which will not make her appearance before September, however. Both ships are from the Harlan & Wolff yards in Ireland. The Lincoln is 616 feet long, with a beam of 68½ feet, and a gross tonnage of about 22,000 tons.

The passenger capacity of the ship is 324 first cabin, 125 second cabin, 1,000 third class and 2,320 fourth class, making a total of 4,000 persons on board during an ordinary trip.

To deal expeditiously with cargo, there are eleven hatches and seven holds. Accommodation is provided for 324 first-class passengers on the promenade, bridge, awning and upper decks, a large number of the staterooms being arranged for one passenger only.

Dining Saloon on Upper Deck.

The first class dining saloon is situated on the upper deck, amidships, and extends the full length of the vessel. Seating accommodation is provided for 228 persons at one sitting. The apartment is tastefully decorated and furnished in polished hardwood, with satinwood and lacrusta panels, and parquet floor.

A gymnasium with a complete outfit of Zander vibratory appliances, electrically operated, is on the boat deck, and on the bridge deck a special room is fitted for electric baths and massage.

CHURCHES WITHOUT STEEPLES

Immense Domes Or Towers When Put to Use Take Place of Spires

Some of the church structures recently built in New York City indicate that the old-fashioned steeple is not popular with modern architects. The Madison Square Presbyterian church, the pastor of which is the Reverend Dr. Charles H. Parkhurst, which has an immense dome, is an example of the new style of ecclesiastical architecture. Situated at the corner of Madison avenue and Twenty-fourth street, it is one of a group of the most striking buildings in New York. To the southwest not more than a hundred yards away is the tall Flatiron; across Twenty-fourth street is the Metropolitan Life, one of the largest office buildings in the world; two blocks to the north is the Madison Square Garden, and across the square is the Fifth Avenue hotel, the old-time rendezvous of National politicians.

The church proper and the parish house are joined so as to form one structure. The exterior is of brick upon a marble base. The floors and dome throughout, and the partitions in the parish house are made of terra cotta tile blocks, so that absolute safety from fire is assured. The cost of the church and parish house was \$325,000.

Another house of worship even stranger than Dr. Parkhurst's is the Broadway Tabernacle (Congregational), at Broadway and Fifty-sixth street. It has the appearance of a combination church and office building. It is also of the most modern fireproof construction, being built of steel protected by hollow terra cotta blocks. It cost \$350,000.

The Tabernacle has a tower, but not the kind commonly associated with churches. All of it is put to use. On its first floor are the Sunday school rooms. Between them and the belfry there is room for all the activities of the church organization. Mission rooms and a ladies' parlor are on the third floor, the young men's library on the fourth, the pastor's study, reception room and church library on the fifth, the sexton's living quarters on the sixth and a museum on the seventh. Above this is the belfry. In the basement are two spacious halls for all sorts of gatherings.

Far outstripping either of these in cost is the First Church of Christ Scientist, better known as the Christian Science church, at Central Park West and Ninety-sixth street. One million, three hundred thousand dollars was spent on this building, exclusive of the cost of the land. It is not accurate to describe it definitely as a church, because it has an organization that treats the sick, keeping open seven days in the week. It is said that 5000 persons come there for treatment from the Christian Science practitioners every year.

Marbles were brought from every corner of the globe to line the walls of this edifice. Huge steel girders support the dome and the galleries. Terra cotta tile of the finest variety makes floors and walls irresistible to fire. There are about 40 rooms, besides the auditorium, in the building. There is no branch of Christian science activity which is not represented there.
