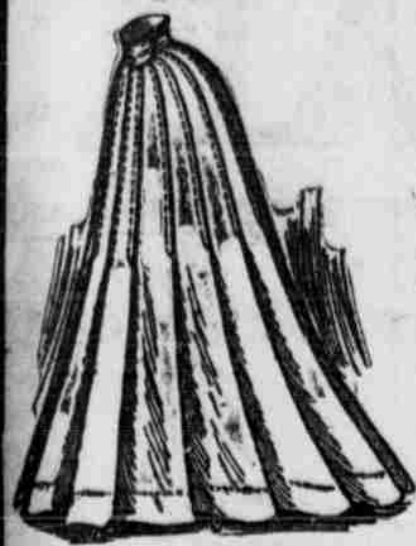

COTTAGE GROVE DEVELOPMENT CONVENTION

It would be justified in combining with any means in their power to secure railroads. This is illustrated by the effect of building a railroad into Tillamook county. The construction of the Lytle railroad has not only not left the beach and goats out and return, spending the day on the bosom of the old Pacific in perfect safety. The writer has often seen women and small children leave the beach at Otter Rock and go out for an hour's fishing. All kinds of salt water fish may be caught off the rocks at the Punch Bowl, and a mile's tramp to Spencer or Rock creeks will repay those who like good fly fishing for mountain trout.

The county court of Lincoln county, aided by her enterprising citizens, has built a splendid wagon road from Newport to the Siletz Bay and to Salmon river, which affords one of the most beautiful scenic drives on the Pacific coast.

Otter Rock is no new place to many of Oregon's citizens, but has never before been placed on the map, owing to the fact that it was in the Siletz Reserve and owned by Indians. The company is now arranging to build and have in operation a sawmill, so that parties desiring to build cottages at Otter Rock may have the lumber on the ground, at a much lower cost than if they were forced to ship it in.

A cool mountain stream runs through the town site. It comes clear and pure from a mountain side two hundred feet above, thus affording plenty of water for all purposes. A hotel will be built and there will be other improvements, a bath-house, postoffice and chute-the-chutes. A telephone line will be in operation by July 1st, and the company has already made arrangements to put on a large automobile, which will make trips every two hours from Newport to Otter Rock. Thus it will be seen that Otter Rock will soon have all the conveniences of Newport and other well known summer resorts.

The town site is laid out in lots, blocks, and acre tracts, and a public square or park of several acres, which is nicely located, will be improved this season.

OTTER ROCK RESTFUL AND BEAUTIFUL

The Most Delightful of Oregon's Many Seaside Resorts

The owners have decided to place this beautiful property on the market. Otter Rock, or by many known as the "Punch Bowl," for a summer resort has few equals on the Pacific Coast. Seventy-five per cent of the people who visit Newport pay their respects to Otter Rock before returning from their summer vacation. In fact, a trip to Newport without seeing Otter Rock would be like going to Portland in the summer time without seeing the "Oaks," the difference being that the hand of God has painted the scenery at Otter Rock, while capital and man's ingenuity has fashioned most of the beauties at the "Oaks."

Nature has been very kind to the dwellers of this favored spot, who in the past have been mostly the red men of the forests, their few wants being supplied by the generous hand of nature; when the tide is out the table is set; the tide ebbs and flows twice every twenty-four hours, and in the rough sands of the sea are fish, clams and oysters, there is drift wood to cook them and salt to season, fern and wild flowers to decorate the table, and the wild waves furnish music and song for entertainment. A visitor thus describes a summer evening at Otter Rock:

The summer skies were rich with sunset's rosy glow; the shades of evening were casting their weird shadows o'er the jagged points of old Otter Rock, the angry breakers were rolling shoreward, casting out great sheets of spray over the glittering sandy beach; the white sea-gulls were spreading their wings to the evening breeze, and the harsh clank of the lonely shags were heard as they sought their lonely roosts high up on the rocks overlooking the grand Pacific.

The faint streaks of the receding day marked the drift of the summer clouds, and low down on the western horizon, brilliant pictures painted in rainbow colors tinted the rolling, restless waves.

An occasional roar reminded one of the presence of the ugly sea-lions, as they sported in the evening twilight. All nature noted the departure of another day, the great orb that warms mother earth had retired, leaving in its place night's cool mantle.

Along the ocean beach and near the towering cliffs could be seen the dusky natives landing their frail canoes as they returned from their day of toil on the billows of the broad Pacific. Now and again might be seen groups of happy children, care-free and shouting their mirth to the ocean breeze, as they tracked the golden sands. Old men and middle aged matrons could be seen arm in arm as they stood at the fountain of health, viewing the wonders of nature, while fair-haired maidens in company with strong and sturdy manhood, all enjoying their summer outing, might be seen in some sheltered cove, watching the great orb of day, as it bathed its face in the clear blue waves and disappeared in the father of waters.

High up on the evergreen hills amid smiling verdure, inhaling the fragrance of wild flowers from nature's own bower, and overshadowing the beach below, if one perchance should cast their eyes seaward, they could feast them on the pictures painted on the old Pacific, or to the north look upon the green forests and moss covered hills, bordering the shores of the old ocean, and in sight of the trackless waters that float the commerce of the world; while away to the south Foulweather's cheery light marked the most westerly point of Uncle Sam's broad domain.

The smoke from a dozen camp fires curled up toward high heaven, while the flickering flames were chasing myriads of sparks which were caught upon the evening breezes and wafted to naught. Happy campers were returning from their day of recreation and pleasure from over hill and dale, some with long strings of trout, the speckled beauty caught with the trifling fly, others with flowers, mosses, ferns and other products of nature's quiet woods, others with rocks and shells of many various colors, sea mosses and sparkling agates, while the tardy lovers still lingered behind, drinkin in the wonders of nature in this beautiful spot and pledging faith with one another. The aged and crippled were bathing their limbs in the salty tide before the

hour of rest, praying that nature's storehouse might portion them out a small share of the fountain of health. All were happy amid the pleasures of their summer outing.

The Hill interests have surveyed a road from Seaside to Newport, which will be built and operating in eighteen months. This road will pass through the town of Otter Rock, and another local road will soon be built from Otter Rock east into the vast timber belt on the Siletz. From the fact that Otter Rock, which some claim was the original Cape Foulweather, extends out for a long distance into the ocean and an outer reef of rocks extends both north and south of Otter Rock for several miles and breaks the ocean swell or rollers long before they reach the shore line, this is one of the most protected points on the coast, and is a favorite bathing place. From the first of June until the middle of October there is hardly a day that a small put new life into the Tillamook country. Thirty miles is built from Forest Grove west. About 100 teams are grading out of Tillamook. The tunnel just out of the city is advancing. Ranches that could be bought a year ago, before there was any certainty of the railroad, for \$2,000 to \$3,000 are selling for \$5,000 to \$7,000. Ten new families are coming where there was one formerly.

The Oregon Electric from Portland to Salem will double the value of all lands close to that line. Property on the line will be trebled and quadrupled. The land will go into dairies and fruit tracts. There will be creameries, cheese factories and canneries all over the Willamette valley as fast as the country gets railroads. Irrigation would still further multiply production. Water would make three crops of hay possible where one grows now. Railroads will put any ordinary land in the Willamette valley up to \$100 an acre. Irrigation will make it worth \$200 from the standpoint of crops alone, in hops, fruit or grass. Transportation, irrigation, fruit, dairying, are the Big Four that add to land values, make the country rich, prosperous, populous and productive. These factors will make western Oregon a gold mine.

The running time of the south-bound overland day train has been extended to 77 minutes—for 26 miles, or about 20 miles an hour. The average speed of this train is about 22 or 23 miles an hour. But to make this time the train has to move at about 35 miles per hour between stations, as there are 17 stops between Portland and Albany.

Safety in operation is the greatest characteristic of the Southern Pacific railroad in Oregon. For 400 miles of its tortuous windings over mountains, its flashings along silver rivers, its dashings over verdant plains, the trained employees have but a single thought, from the man mounted in the cab of the towering thunderer that pulls the train, to the humblest bridge-tender—and that thought is the security and safety of the lives of passengers. The death rate is the lowest of any American railroad.

West Coquille Precinct Dry.

In an opinion handed down by Attorney-General Crawford, in answer to a query from Hon. John F. Hall, county judge of Coos county, asking whether the local option vote taken in West Coquille precinct in 1906 holds that precinct prohibition, notwithstanding another vote was had in 1907, and resulted in a vote against prohibition, and also the West Coquille precinct voted against prohibition. The opinion holds that the precinct is still dry, as was voted in 1906, as no vote can change that decision for a term of two years.
