CRANKS LEAGUES AND FADS

Britishers Have Attack of Society Forming Habit

The wily policeman lying in wait behind a hedge to trap a motorist finds it more difficult every day to secure a "case," owing to the association which motorists have formed. Pedestrians, not to be outdone, have recently formed a league for the protection of our highways from their dangerous use by motorists. The object of this league is to act as a rallying center for all those who object to motorists having more than a fair share of the roads, the cost of maintaining which falls upon all classes of society. The members join hands with the police in endeavoring to bring car owners who exceed the speed limit to book.

A useful league is that which has for its object the suppression of London fogs. There is a distinguished Royal Academician at the head of it is the person of Sir W. Richmond. It argues that the black fogs of London are caused through smoke, and that if smoke chimneys were suppressed these fogs would be things of the past. The league reports and occasionally takes it upon itself to prosecute factory owners, bakers and others whose chimneys smoke objectionably. It may not be generally known that offenders in this respect can be haled before the local coroner, who has the power to inflict a heavy fine.

Many curious leagues are in existence throughout the country, one of them having been established for the purpose of promoting the interbreeding of butterflies and moths. Hybrid varieties even of the common butterfly are extremely rare, and the members of this league devote themselves to producing new specimens, chiefly of the Red Admiral and the Peacock.

Sunflower and vegetable marrow leagues are also common in the country, and considerable rivalry exists among the members in the production of gigantic sunflowers and marrows. The Sweet Pea league, by offering substantial prizes to the cultivator of this particular flower, has succeeded in the last few years in producing some sweet peas which for size, color and fragrance were formerly unknown.

Some time ago the Anti-Tea-Duty league was formed. It placarded the boardings with attractive posters, and probably through its agitation part of the tax on tea was re-

duced. Since the reduction not much has been heard of the league.

Then there is the "league for the protection of the people against the police." It costs five shillings yearly to join this association. Its members wear a blue enameled badge and report police constables for any dereliction of duty that may come under their notice.

Very frequently leagues which appear to be ridiculous in their objects have led to useful action on the part of the authorities. The "league for the disinfection of watercress" flooded London with literature that was calculated to make the watercress eater's flesh creep at the thought of the bacteria that lurked in the innocent looking little plants.

Recently the County Council investigated the statements of this league, with the result that an inspection of watercress beds was ordered. 70 out of 240 were found to be polluted, and consequently closed. Today a strict watch is kept over the beds so the league may be said to have justified its existence.

Some three centuries ago a league was formed in France, known as the League of St. Vincent de Paul, which now exists in all Roman Catholic countries. Its objects are manifold. It provides medical comforts for the sick, visits prisoners and endeavors to start them afresh in life on their release. From this league sprang most of the beneficent societies which are in existence today, such as the Discharged Prisoners' Aid Society, the Society for the Prevention of Cruelty to Children and other kindred associations.

Faddists are responsible for many leagues. There are people who object to birds being confined in cages, rabbits in hutches, pigeons in cofts, and so on, and who form associations to remedy these evils.

Some extraordinary leagues exist in connection with the legal fraternity. The Brotherhood of the Central Criminal Court, the headquarters of which are at a hostelry close to the Temple, is one of the most peculiar of these societies. Only wardens and officials of the old—or shall we say new?—Bailey, and barristers' clerks whose employers have either prosecuted or defended murderers are allowed to join.

The principal object is to perpetuate the traditions and customs of the old Bailey, and every year a dinner is held at which a snuff box, which is said to have belonged to Jonathan Wild, is handed round with great solemnity.—Parson's Weekly.

MANY RETAIL FAILURES IN GARMENT TRADE

New York, June 12.—There are many failures reported in the retail garment trade for women's wear as a consequence of the utter failure of spring trade. The manufacturers who have sold large quantities of goods to retailers are reporting slow collections on account, and there are general unsatisfactory conditions existing throughout the cutting trade. Separate skirts and complete costume in medium weight cloths were ordered freely during the initial order period for the spring season, as the retailers looked forward to normal conditions prevailing. They have received their stocks, and have had them on exhibition for upward of 12 weeks, as many of them showed their first styles during the opening week of March. At no time has there been an even moderate movement in these goods in any section of the country, except the extreme west. It is only on the high grade cloaks and suits that a normal call on retailers is being made. The department stores handling costumes and wraps of the better quality have succeeded in selling their first purchases, and are in the market taking fresh supplies from the garment trade.
