WILSONS LINE TO YELLOWSTONE PARK.

Branch of Harriman Road to Southern Entrance Almost Completed.

Chicago, June 12.—Travelers to Yellowstone Park will soon have a new and more picturesque line of approach to this wonderland. Work has begun some time ago on an extension of the Oregon Short Line from St. Anthony, Idaho, to the Madison river entrance at the southern corner of the Park. It is now more than half completed and the Harriman engineers constructing the line say that track will be laid this year on the proportion remaining to be built. There is a gap of only about fifteen miles between the finished portion of the Yellowstone Park railroad, as the new line is to be called, and its terminus at the Madison river point of entry.

Scientifically the new railroad route through the Colorado Rockies will be very attractive. The Continental divide through Rea's Pass is crossed at an elevation of 7,000 feet, and for a long stretch in the Warm River canyon, about 25 miles from St. Anthony, the engineers were faced by one of the heaviest pieces of railway construction undertaken in the west since the first transcontinental lines were built.

Tourist traffic will form the larger part of the business of the road. Between St. Anthony and Marysville the line passes through a rich agricultural district. Northeastward from Marysville it traverses, for the most part, forest reserve land of great natural beauty, and a favorite hunting ground. To build this 70 miles of road will cost about \$1,500,000. Mr. Harriman, it is said, planned it after a trip with one of the oldest Yellowstone guides who pointed out the advantages of a southern railroad entrance to the Park. The Short Line's present route ends at Florida, from which it is a day's stage ride to the Park.

Opening Lands for Homeseekers.

Chicago, June 12.—How the railroad revolutionizes socially and physically the country through which it passes was never better shown than in the changes wrought by a 50-mile stretch of track from Stockdale to Cuero, Texas. This line traversing open prairie country, closed the gap on the Victoria division of the Galveston, Harrisburg and San Antonio Railway between San Antonio and Cuero, and with the line from Cuero to Port Lavaca gives San Antonio a direct line to the gulf. It also opens up an additional line between San Antonio and Houston by way of Stockdale, providing an additional incentive to the development of the entire coast country, which in the past decade has made wonderful progress.

But the change that has come over the country traversed by the Stockdale-Cuero extension is the most interesting features of this sociological exhibit. The road opened for settlement a wonderfully fertile and productive section of the state, including portions of four counties. Until very recently the entire section traversed by the Victoria division of the G. H. and S. A., controlled by the Southern Pacific, was dominated absolutely by the cattle kings. The cheap fertile lands made accessible by the railroad, however, have proved too strong an incentive to be resisted by the home seeker, and in place of the seven towns that the latest maps show between Cuero and San Antonio, scores of prosperous communities are now established, many of them rapidly achieving modest distinction in trade.

Melon and vegetable culture and general crop growing are rapidly increasing, and toward the Gulf end of the line the sugar cane industry is making marked progress. Immediately following the opening of the Cuero-Stockdale line one-tenth of the country bordering upon it was thrown into cultivation, chiefly cotton. This agricultural development is slowly but surely displacing the cattle industry and making 50 homes grow where one existed in the days when vast cattle ranches occupied the country.

Witch Hunting in Africa.

A remarkable tale of native superstition and credulity was told at the magistrate's court yesterday morning, when eight Mashona natives from the M'rewas district underwent preliminary examination for committing certain offenses under the witchcraft suppression ordinance. The eight natives were all relatives, and the father of some of them died recently. Not being quite satisfied that death was due to natural causes, appeal was made to a certain native named Chibanda, who the prosecutor stated was a well-known witch doctor, though this fact was not elicited in evidence. The outcome of the incantations was that two of the sons, Mapira and Katiwa, visited a neighboring kraal and accused a native woman named Kajlwa of having bewitched their father and caused his death.

They demanded of the husband of this lady that she should undergo an ordeal to test the truth of the allegations. The husband asked for three days' grace, saying he wanted his wife's uncle to be present at the trial. When this space had elapsed Chitandaria, the husband, accompanied by his wife and her uncle, a native named Denti, set out for the kraal at which the ordeal was to take place. On arrival the party was directed to a small spruit below the kraal, where the eight natives sat in conclave.

Chibanda was master of ceremonies, and sat cooking some liquid in a pot. When the medicine was cooked the lady was told to take a draught. It was explained that two draughts of this medicine would act either as an emetic or a purgative should the women be a witch. Two draughts were administered, but left the lady undisturbed.

Chibanda thereupon again plied the medicine, evidently determined that the oracle should work, and after the unfortunate female had taken twenty-one doses nature rebelled and the medicine acted in its dual capacity. On this five of the natives sprang up with assegais and kerries, crying: "There is the witch who killed our father. Let us kill her." But the husband and uncle came to the rescue. After some discussion the bereaved sons agreed to be compensated, and as a first installment the uncle handed over a Kaffir hoe, telling them if they killed his niece he would inform on them. The lady and her relatives then went back to their respective kraals. Three days afterwards the two natives, Mapira and Katiwa, revisited the lady's husband and demanded the witch to be handed over to them to be killed. This he refused to do, and later the woman escaped to the native commissioner. — Rhodesia Herald.
