ordered the sheriff to perform his full duty. He called the sheriff to his house. Sheriff Southland, of Shoshone county, confirmed this story, and declared he unloaded the bomb after it was turned over to him. C. T. Roach, a Denver plumber, told of making the Penbody bomb, at the request of Orchard, who told him he wanted it to hold acids.

When court reconvened the defense threw a bombshell into the prosecution by announcing that it had no desire to cross-examine Penbody. Borah said he purposely refrained from an extended examination in the hope he would be questioned at length by Richardson, and then on re-direct the state could lift the lid on the entire Colorado

If they fail to return their places will be filled by other union linemen. The linemen went on a sympathetic strike to support the striking operators. The council decided that the strike of the local union was unauthorized and in violation of the agreement with the telephone company.

At a meeting of the county commissioners this morning, at the Marion county court house, the petitions, pro and con, of the Silverton-Marquam road were received. The matter was continued until Friday, June 21, in order to investigate the conditions more thoroughly. This is the road that was to have been constructed under the Tuttle road act and extends a distance of five miles, from Silverton to Marquam. A petition, which was signed by 71 citizens residing near Silverton requested that their respective names be stricken from the petition objecting to the road, as they had signed the first document before thoroughly understanding the situation.
