## MYSTERY OF EGYPT'S PYRAMIDS

### Cheops a Compendium of Knowledge of Early Egyptians

Of all numbers the one held in lowest esteem in either folklore, proverb or popular parlance the number 5. Except for its being represented in the Druid's foot—symbol of witchcraft—which has five points, it is rarely mentioned. It has been the numeric stepchild, the Cinderella among numbers, but has now, at last, come into its full share of recognition through the recent discoveries of a civil engineer.

He found that in the construction of the pyramid of Cheops number 5 plays a most important, mysterious part, which cannot possibly have been the result of mere fortuitous chance. In fact, the preservation of the venerable old relic of a civilization of more than 4000 years ago is due in a great measure, the engineer says, to the influence of this number. Despite its artistic simplicity, the pyramid of Cheops is undoubtedly one of the most complicated edifices of all times. It is, in fact, a complete compendium of all the wonderful mathematical and astronomical knowledge of the early Egyptians. It is a testimonial not only of the devotion of a great people who designed it as a lasting monument to their beloved monarch, Cheops, but also the high degree of science to which they had attained.

The height of the pyramid is in a ratio of 1 to 3.14156 to its circumference. This is the so-called "Ludolf proportion," which represents the relation between the diameter and the circumference as well as the area of the circle.

The circumference is 3.14159 times as great as the diameter; the area 3.14159 times the square of the radius. If the length of the sides is divided into as many parts as there are days in the year, each division will be a pyramid-meter (about a yard). One of these pyramid-meters is the twenty-millionth part of the axis of the earth. Its length is twenty-five pyramid inches.

Multiply this number by 1,000,000,000 and you have the exact distance of the earth from the sun.

And now for the role which number 5 plays in connection with the wonderful structure:

The pyramid is pentagonal; that is, it has five sides and five angles. The Royal crypt is on the fiftieth structural stratum, and its walls consist of five thicknesses of granite blocks.

The engineer who made these researches says that he is of the opinion that the builders of the pyramid chose the pentagonal form with a view—partly, at least—to durability. His reason for this belief is that in a pentagon the sides and the diagonal are almost commensurable, while in no quadrilateral figure that can be constructed is this the case.

The result of this commensurability between the sides and the diagonal is to give the structure well-nigh indestructible strength. To this fact mainly does the great pyramid owe its existence in almost undiminished grandeur in the face of the stress and storm of so many thousands of years.

And thus the long-deposed number 5 has become enthroned at last among the great mystic numbers.
