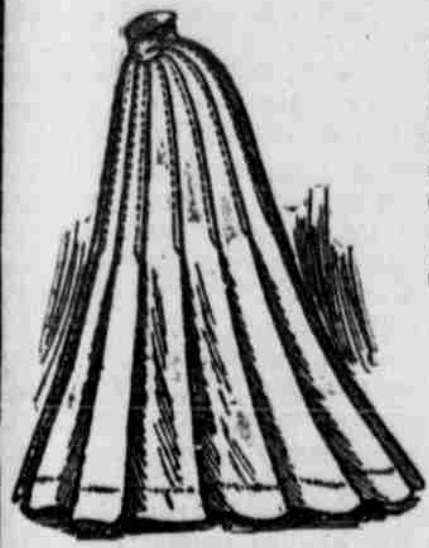

A fire which started from a burning rubbish pile destroyed the large sawmill building formerly used by the Oregon Lumber Company, at Hood River, Monday. The building was partly empty, as the machinery, with the exception of the large engine, boilers and a smaller engine for operating the electric light plant had been removed to the company's big plant at Dee. The loss is estimated at several thousand dollars.

The recent rains have had a most beneficial effect upon the grasses of the ranges of Eastern Oregon. Already sheep and cattlemen are beginning to occupy the localities they arranged for during the stockman's convention last fall with the forest reserve officials. Several bands of sheep are en route to and expected in the vicinity of Sumpter any day. It is not thought there will be any ruthless slaughter of sheep like that which has disgraced the state during past years, owing to the satisfactory arrangements made in allotting ranges of the reserves, as each individual is protected by his agreement with the government.

At the regular annual meeting in Woodburn district Monday Colonel J. M. Poorman was re-elected director for three years and George A. Landon was chosen clerk for one year. The annual report shows a bonded indebtedness of \$6000, with \$1400 in the sinking fund; receipts during past year, \$7287.95; disbursements, \$5260.79; cash on hand, \$2027.16.

R. H. Greer was re-elected director and Peter Bosco clerk of the Hillsboro schools Monday, both without opposition. The clerk's report shows the teachers are all paid, with over \$700 in the treasury, and the indebtedness of the district is about \$2300, a great reduction in the last few years. Total enrollment for the year was 523.

The German Ocean Marine.

A correspondent of the London Chronicle, writing from Berlin under date of May 26th, speaks of German progress in the shipping industry as follows:

In German shipping and commercial circles the sixtieth anniversary of the foundation of the Hamburg-American line, which takes place today, is regarded as an event of the greatest importance.

It is proudly pointed out that this line has become the greatest in the world, far surpassing the nearest of its British rivals in the extent of its operations and the number and tonnage of its ships. The capital of the company exceeds \$5,000,000, its employees exceed 18,000, and its ocean-going fleet numbers 149 vessels, with a tonnage of over 725,000. In addition there is a swarm of river vessels and tugs, with a tonnage of nearly 150,000. The entire fleet is valued at \$7,000,000.

There are fifty regular passenger and cargo liners, calling at over 300 harbors. In the United States alone the company employs 2000 agents.

Almost every German journal devotes a lengthy article to the extraordinary prosperity of the company, and in all cases it is pointed out that the success of the company is due to German enterprise and in competition with old-established British lines. Further, it is remarked that ships of this Hamburg line are trading now in waters which, until quite recently, were regarded as British preserves—for example, in the Indian, Chinese and Australian seas, and even in the Persian gulf.

The present director of the line, Herr Ballin—who, by the way, is a Jew—is the Kaiser's personal friend, and it is an open secret that much of the enterprise which has recently distinguished the company has been due to his majesty's personal initiative. Every success of the company is rewarded with a telegram of congratulation to Herr Ballin.

Effects of Our Inspection Law.

Following the promulgation of the new meat inspection law in the United States the canned meat trade is, according to latest advices, rapidly increasing, and it appears likely that within a short time the consumption will be as large as formerly. The regulations are so rigid and the packers, it would appear, are so eager to carry them out to the letter that they are introducing many new ideas and methods, which will entirely disarm adverse criticism in the future. Published figures show that the growth of the export trade in meats of various kinds from the United States during the last twelve months has been wonderful.

Apart from the new American meat inspection and pure food laws, which for stringency are more severe than any yet enacted by any other nation in the world, the stockyards in all the great packing centers, like Chicago, Omaha and Kansas City, are, we learn, being transformed into model cities, so that the new conditions will appeal to even the most fastidious visitor as being of the most wholesome and up-to-date character. Large contracts for canned beef for the British Government are now being executed in Chicago, and an interview given by the officer recently detailed to be there on the spot, watching every process, was to the effect that he was extremely pleased with everything he had seen.—Grocers' Gazette of London.

Ecaussines Annual Marriage Fair.

Twenty-seven engagements are announced in consequence of the annual "marriage fair" held at Ecaussines on Whit Monday. There are indications that at least a dozen other bachelors who attended the fair will be married in the near future.

The marriageable maidens of Ecaussines, dismayed at the tendency of the young men of the town to emigrate and find wives elsewhere, formed a guild and organized this annual entertainment, to which all bachelors are invited.

Every eligible bachelor who arrived at Ecaussines on Whit Monday had to sign the gold-lettered register at the Town Hall, and to give an account of his parentage, present position, and future prospects. Then they assembled in the gayly decorated market place, which was crowded with sympathetic spectators, some of whom had chosen wives at former fairs.

The local band played a languishing "berceuse" from a platform in the center of the square, after which the members of the guild, dressed in pretty spring costumes, ascended the platform, and their president, Miss Glende, welcomed the bachelors in a graceful little speech.

The Native Brand of Socialists.

There is a widely prevalent idea that the main strength of the various Socialist groups in the United States comes from the foreign born. The notion is an error, and the readiness of many intelligent persons to accept it as a matter of course shows how little they understand the value of our immigration. Charles Levine, in a letter to the Times, comments on the use of "The Marseillaise" and of banners bearing non-English inscriptions for Socialist parades in New York. Many Socialist leaders are aliens. The only considerable philosophers of the propaganda are Europeans, and when one of their disciples has been able to talk himself across the ocean nothing is likely to render him inarticulate after he gets here. The foreign accent, so to speak, of the American Socialist movement is given to it by the loudest voices; and to the Socialistic barometer a European wind forecasts the severest lung-storm. The Socialist party here sounds foreign, but is it?

In the presidential contest of 1904 New York state cast 2 per cent of its total vote for Debs. In the country as a whole Debs got 3 per cent. Yet New York state had in 1900 only 73 per cent of its inhabitants native born, whereas the United States had 86 per cent native born. New York's immigrants seem not to have dragged her into Socialism, but on the contrary, to have defended her against it. West Virginia with 97 per cent native, gave the Socialists 6 per cent of her vote; Florida, with 95 per cent native, 5 per cent. Illinois, where Debs polled 6 per cent, or twice the rate the nation threw to him, had precisely the national proportion of native born—86. Idaho, with 85 per cent native, rolled up 6 per cent for him, while Oregon, also with the national percentage of natives, 86, even made it 8 per cent for Debs.

The truth is that the rank and file, the "speechless" immigrants, have escaped from Europe, not because they don't want to work, but because they did, and hoped in this country to lay by something to show for their toil. They are the most enterprising members of the community from which they hail, or they would not have pulled up stakes. They have to become acquainted with our institutions by studying them, as many of them must with our language, and, like a foreigner learning English, they often discover in things American excellences and shades of meaning which natives are too familiar with to appreciate. Americans by adoption, they have something of the zeal of the convert. They love this country because they have tried others. With them patriotism means something more than sentiment. To charge such an element with a chief share in the so-called "Socialist" attack on marriage, religion and the responsibility and right of the individual to earn his bread in the sweat of his face for a proportionate reward is to withhold appreciation from men who have done as much as any others to safeguard liberty and preserve the Republic.

No country, not even America, is without its indigenous victims of chronic fatigue. The most interesting things about Socialism in this country are that there are plenty of native born among its followers, and that there are plenty of immigrants who know it is all stuff and nonsense.—New York Times.
