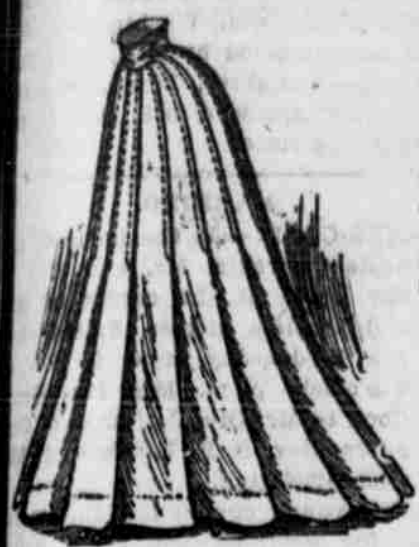

DEMANDS AN OPEN RIVER

Canneryman Hume of Curry County At Salem

Hon. R. D. Hume, of Wedderburn, is in the city, making a fight for the opening of the Rogue river, so that the salmon industry will not become extinct. As all know, for five years past water power dams have been constructed without fishways, and millions of fine fish have died in the river on account of inability to get to the spawning grounds. The result has been fatal to the industry. The catch on the lower river this year is reduced to almost nothing, and the end is not yet. The failure to build fishways over the dams, and the wanton destruction of the fishery has been carried so far that if the state does not step in and enforce the state laws the expenditures for hatcheries, canneries and the homes and property of both fishermen and owners of the grounds will be destroyed.

Mr. Hume has developed a system of feeding the young spawn that has resulted in stocking the river as fast as the fish were taken out, but the obstructions in the streams for mills and power plants has more than overcome the benefits of artificial propagation by private enterprise, by the state and national government. The whole matter is to be gone over by the state fish commission and State Warden Van Dusen is to be invited to Salem to meet Mr. Hume and hear his propositions. The general public is deprived of its fish supply by the blocking and destruction of the Rogue river. It is to be hoped, from the standpoint of the rest of the people who do not live on the river, that the salmon industry will not be allowed to be destroyed by a few grasping corporations on the upper river. Mr. Hume says if for two days in the week there could be unobstructed runs for the fish the whole length of the river the fish would propagate themselves, and the supply could never be exhausted. But the greed of man will destroy the richest gifts of nature, if left unrestrained.

Governor Chamberlain and the fish warden are planning a trip to Curry county at an early day to make a personal investigation.

THE SWEDE GOT MAD.

Hunted Up and Licked the Man Who Robbed Him.

J. Summer, an escapee from the Canyon county jail of Idaho, and who was held in that state on the charge of larceny, arrived in this city some time Tuesday and immediately proceeded to get busy, narrates the Huntington Herald. He proceeded up the track and held up a Swede taking his watch and some change. The Swede was evidently too surprised to offer resistance and gave up without a murmur.

Later, the Swede evidently got to thinking the matter over and thought he would go on a man hunt himself. He went up the river and made several inquiries about the footpad, but could get no trace of him. The Swede then began to beat the brush around where he was held up, with the result that he ran across Summer, and there was, from all indications, one of the most desperate battles that has ever been fought in this section. Alone, and with no witnesses, they went at it like two fiends, fighting for how long, no body knows, but long enough to trample out 20 yards of the brush and make it look like a cyclone had hit it and that it had afterwards been used for a slaughter pen, blood being all over the battle ground. Finally Summer succumbed to the powers of the Swede, who beat and kicked his face into a pulp. The Swede in the scrap got a bad lick over the eye and his thumb in the other fellow's mouth with disastrous results. After the Swede had conquered his opponent into submission he started with him for town, arriving he turned him loose. Later they were both arrested and placed in the city jail. How badly Summer was injured it was not definitely known as the sheriff of Canyon county arrived the next day and took the prisoner back on the Pony.

ROSE CITY SHY ON BUNTING

Seventeen Bolts All Available For Decorating the City

With only 17 bolts of pink and green bunting, the official colors of the rose fiesta, Portland is not making as extensive a showing in the decorating line as the occasion warrants, says a Portland paper. The lack of ornamentation is due to the wholesale supply houses.

Over a month ago the committee announced the colors for decorating, thereby giving the wholesale merchants time in which to secure a stock of bunting. One store had 17 bolts, and this was all the green and pink in the city. The largest jobbing house in the Northwest is located in Portland, and this establishment did not have an inch in stock. Although the managers of the wholesale houses knew that there would be a heavy call for the pink and green bunting, each depended on the other to supply the demand. This proved a piece of misplaced confidence all around, with the unpleasant consequence of robbing the city of decorations.

Comparatively few stores and buildings have been decorated with the colors, and these are not especially elaborate, as the 17 bolts of bunting were made to go as far as possible. The early birds, as usual, bought all they could, and the procrastinator now finds that the market is exhausted.

The rose carnival promised to see Portland decorated as it has seldom been ornamented before on other festive occasions; but through the lack of enterprise on the part of the supply houses only a few decorations are visible. Fourth of July decorations are now being resorted to, and the absence of pink and green is being remedied, in a measure, by red, white and blue, and sometimes yellow and red.

While the colors selected by the carnival committee are most appropriate and are common, the wholesalers do not carry them in stock. This is a drawback to a certain extent. Had the market been properly attended to, nearly every building and store would today be gay with colors.

At several places the decorations were completed before the bunting supply was exhausted. These are just enough to indicate what could have been accomplished had the supply been adequate. It will teach a lesson, however, for next year, when the rose fiesta is held, the merchants will see that there is enough bunting for every one.

MORE BATTLE SHIPS

Washington, June 20.—Bids were opened by the navy department this afternoon for two new battleships of the Dreadnaught type, their speed to be 21 knots and displacement 20,000 tons. One will cost nearly \$4,000,000 and the other \$4,500,000.

May Try to Force Stub Service.
A Salem special yesterday says: The matter of poor passenger train service on the Southern Pacific, especially south to north, having been taken up with the company officials by the railroad commission, after numerous complaints had been lodged, and the company having failed to remedy the conditions complained of within a reasonable time, the commission will likely set a hearing for the subject at an early date, with a view to compelling the company to put on a stub train service from Roseburg to Portland when scheduled passenger trains are reported more than one hour late.
