PATTERSON UNDER BONDS

John Patterson, who is charged with assault with a deadly weapon upon Otto Williams, the McCoy stage driver, was this morning arraigned in Judge Moores' court, and, after the testimony was taken and the case argued, was bound over to appear in the circuit court, with bail fixed at \$200. Williams, who resides on the corner of Ferry and Fourteenth streets, testified that he had his horses in a certain pasture, which was rented from Patterson, and that Patterson, without provocation, drove his horses out and beat them with clubs and rods. Williams said he told Patterson to put the horses back, which Patterson refused to do. In order to prevent the horses running over him, Williams said he picked up a club. He struck at one of the horses, and as he did so Patterson sprang out from behind the animal and stabbed him in the left breast with a pocket knife. Mrs. Isaac Lynch, who was a witness for the defense testified that Williams picked up a large stick or rail, and as he ran toward Patterson he raised the club and tried to strike him over the head, but the witness claims that she did not see Patterson stab Williams, as she ran into the house to phone to the chief of police. Mrs. Black testified that she had the property rented, and that Williams had rented of her. There seemed to be a misunderstanding over the time that Mrs. Black should give possession of the property. She claims she was never notified in writing to vacate, neither was there a definite time set, while the defense claims that she was given legal notice, and neither she nor Williams had any rights on the premises. Mrs. John Graber was subpoenaed by the prosecution. Patterson did not go on the stand nor was the knife or the club used in the controversy exhibited.

A Salem Invention—

H. W. Hatch, the Salem miller, has about perfected an invention which will prove a blessing to farmers and millers. It is a device for separating wheat from vetch seed. As a rule the vetch seed and the wheat kernel are about the same size and weight, which fact has made it very difficult to separate them, either by sifting or blowing. But this invention is a continuous spiral trough through which the wheat is run, and the vetch, being round, is thrown by centrifugal force into the outer trough. This completely separates the two grains, as by a test in which half wheat and half vetch were run through they came out clearly separated. This invention is sure to prove a boon to farmers and grain handlers, and may prove a bonanza to the inventor.
