BREEZE GIBSON'S DRAGONS.

Polk County Genius Assists Old Lady Nature.

Breeze Gibson has been at work again. As first assistant to Dame Nature, his job being to put the finishing touches on such little things the old girl neglected completing. The latest production of the Dame's handiwork and Breeze's skill is in the form of a mirror frame. It is made from a natural crook, or growth of soft maple, and makes a very apt illustration of what might be called the "bone of contention." The frame was originally the top of a stump, the sap or wood growing up over it, forming what is known as a "muley." From what is now the bottom of the frame two arching necks bend out, and, describing a half circle come almost together at the top. The end of each arm makes a very life-like representation of a dragon's head, which likeness has been enhanced by the shaping of the mouths and the addition of teeth. The heads do not quite meet, and between them is a growth, which looks as though each of the dragons had hold of it with his teeth. The curving necks are full of wrinkles, and have a remarkably life-like appearance. The base is a section of maple knot, and the whole is as unique bit of furniture as was ever made. It has been said that in an Oregon vine maple thicket anything from a pack-saddle to a piano can be cut out from the natural crooks, and Gibson has about demonstrated that this is true.

To Prevent Referendum.

John F. Logan has filed a complaint in department No. 2 of the Marion county court against F. W. Benson, as secretary of state, praying for a decree of the court enjoining the defendant, or his agents, from submitting to the votes of the people of the state of Oregon the act entitled: "An act to regulate the appropriation of land for corporate purposes, and to require the grant of personal right during their term of office to public officials to travel over transportation lines as a condition precedent to the right of action for the condemnation of land, and to prohibit the payment of mileage for such free travel." The complaint sets forth that the petition, which is on file in the secretary of state's office, to refer the bill is void, in that it did not contain the "warning" clause, and is therefore defective and ineffectual as a petition. The defendant, by his attorney, A. M. Crawford, has filed a demurrer.

SILVERTON TO PINE TREE.

Road Matter Postponed Until July 2, to Adjust Taxation.

Action on the road which is proposed to be built, under the Tuttle act, from Silverton to "Pine Tree," a distance of five miles, was yesterday postponed by the county court to Tuesday, July 2, 1907, in order to adjust the taxing of the school property which adjoins the road.

Attorney L. J. Adams, of Silverton, yesterday presented a petition signed by nearly 100 of the citizens of his vicinity, asking that their names be stricken from the remonstrance to the road.

All property that adjoins the road will be taxed for the construction work, and, as there is no provision for school property being taxed, the question was postponed in order that the directors might be given time to adjust the valuation of all the school properties, which comprise all school districts, or about 15 acres in all.
