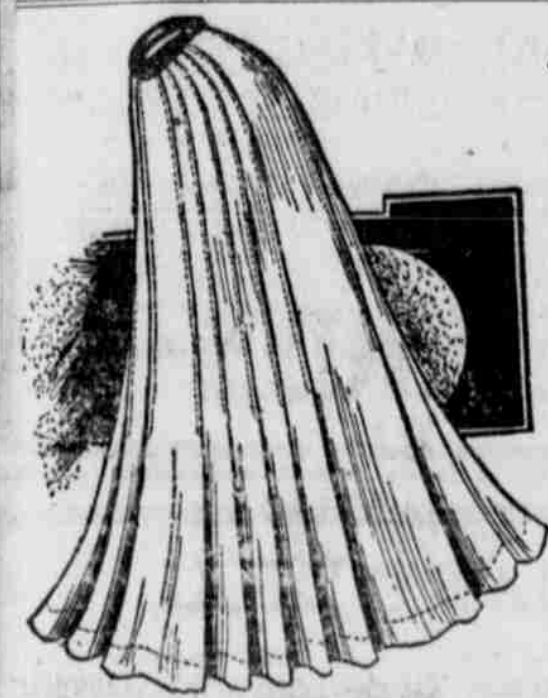

Harvest Has Begun.

Hermiston, Ore., June 28.—The cutting of the first field of wheat in Umatilla county was begun Wednesday, when a heading crew entered the 160-acre field of Thad Barnes, six miles from Hermiston. Several other fields will be harvested within a few days in the same section, and a bumper crop is assured, as the grain is about past all danger of injury.

The crop yield in this locality is interesting from the fact that until within the past few years much of the land now seeded was considered too dry for anything but lizards and jackrabbits. It is now yielding magnificent crops, and Hermiston farmers have predicted that the Barnes grain will run as high as 50 bushels to the acre. A better knowledge of dry-land farming and more rain during the past few years accounts for the change in the condition of this country. This season has also been one of exceptional advantage to growing grain. A large amount of rain, usually falling at the need-of time, and warm growing weather, without excessive heat, have all combined to produce what will be one of Umatilla county's greatest wheat crops.

In the middle and northern portion of the county the wheat is from two or four weeks later than that on the Columbia River slope, and the yield is always better. Ideal weather conditions prevail all over the county. A heavy rain of last week, which is always desired in June, has been followed by bright, warm weather. Eastern Oregon farmers always feel assured of a big and safe yield if they have a good rain in the latter part of June. This year they have had one in the middle of the month and another one about a week later.

Considerable hay was down during the last rain, but as much of it was in the cock no damage is reported, and a good crop will be had in all sections.
