STAY WITH THE ORE

Some Points About Prospecting Mineral Bearing Veins

The cross-examination that every mining investor should employ before going into a mining venture to ascertain the finer points of the contemplated investment, requires considerable study so as to cover the vital factors. In a recent meeting of an English company in London a manager referred to the production of a Mexican mine as being \$50,000 a day, whereupon a stockholder asked whether the gentleman was talking in terms of American or Mexican currency, receiving the reply that the speaker was not sure which it was.

Of all the counting of chickens before they are hatched, there is none so mistaken as the estimation of ore in untried veins and the talk of reserves to be obtained by cutting a lode at one point.

A company is organized to exploit a promising prospect, and a certain sum of money is raised to make a mine out of a hole in the ground. Instead of following the ore exposed at the outcrop, or cut in a prospector's trench, to determine how far it extends and how much expenditure in equipment it may justify, the management decides to start a shaft that is planned to cut the vein at a depth of several hundred feet. In the meanwhile, the ore of the outcrop gives assurance that there is something there, and the pretentious scheme of operations tends to magnify the possibilities. Before the shaft or the cross-cut from it can reach the lode, a large amount of stock has been sold and most of the working capital has been spent.

Should the cross-cut or shaft intersect the vein at a poor spot, as is quite possible, the shareholders are needlessly discouraged. Sometimes so much money has been spent in taking this long shot that no more remains, and the mine passes into other hands or into those of the insiders. Even if all is square and above-board, the shaft and cross-cut may be succeeded by a raise and by intermediate drifts before it is made plain that the vein has changed its dip between surface and 500 feet, or that the ore shoot has a pitch different from that inferred at the grass roots.

It is because miners know something of the vagaries of ore occurrence that they take short views and prefer to go slowly in their explorations, says the Mining & Scientific Press. Only simpletons plan adits to cross-cut creation at a great depth or sink shafts to intercept ore-shoots of unknown character. It will be said that it is cheaper to hoist ore through a permanent vertical shaft than through a prospecting incline, and that it is better mining to extract ore through an adit than to raise it through a shaft. Provided you have the ore. Get the evidence of the ore, its shape and its position, then go ahead and plan to extract it cheaply. The best mining is the cheapest mining; the cheapest is that which yields the maximum profit during the period of ownership, and to this we add the proviso that the profit is supposed to come from the economical treatment of the ore, and not from exploiting the simplicity of our fellow citizens.

SPEED ON THE HIGHWAYS.

Will the Public Stand for the Tremendous Risk.

The following clipping from the San Francisco Chronicle, gives an idea of the speed made by automobiles over country roads, and also an idea of the danger that must necessarily threaten any other traveler on the public highways. Mr. Levy claims to have traveled more than sixty miles an hour. Should some one else be traveling in the opposite direction, it would follow that the machines would cover two miles in a minute, and the chances of avoiding each other would be practically zero.

"In some of the stretches between Santa Cruz and San Leandro I must have traveled faster than sixty miles an hour," said Sol J. Levy, who has just returned from a trip to the city by the sea in a thirty-five horsepower Matheson roadster. Levy left San Francisco with his brother-in-law Saturday about noon. The trip from Oakland to Santa Cruz was made in four hours' actual running time, allowing for stops at San Jose and elsewhere along the road where the scenery or other things interested the travelers. It was on the return trip Sunday, however, that Levy let the car out. The journey was made with hardly a stop, and the distance of some eighty miles was made in about three hours.

"A good deal of the road between Santa Cruz and San Leandro is in the most beautiful shape," said Levy. "In some places it is just as smooth as the floor of my office, and traveling at fifty or sixty miles an hour is perfectly safe. It was impossible to resist the temptation to turn the car loose. Whenever I saw a cloud of dust in the distance I cut out to get it, and, once passed, I looked for the next. I made several side trips from Santa Cruz, so that my mileage was more than 250. In making that I used only twenty-five gallons of gasoline."
