MISS HILL CHOSEN AS GODDESS

Splendid Program Arranged and Sports to Suit Everybody

Miss Maud Hill was the fortunate young lady who drew the ticket last evening which entitles her to be Salem's Goddess of Liberty. She is the daughter of W. W. Hill, of North Salem, and is well known in this city. She was the representative of the United Artisans, the Royal Neighbors and the Modern Woodmen, the latter being the winning vote. Miss Hill's competitors were Miss Martha Sheridan, representative of the Woodmen of the World and Silver Bell Circle; Miss Ella Donaldson, candidate of the A. O. U. W., and Miss Edith Mapletorpe, candidate of the Maccabees. The contest was carried on harmoniously and netted the sum of \$70, of which amount \$50 will be presented to the Goddess-elect, and the remaining \$20 will be placed in the general Fourth of July fund.

Parades.

Arrangements have been made for two big parades, to be given on Salem's streets on the Fourth. Del Dinmore is chairman of the morning parade, and reports that the work of his committee is progressing nicely, and the march will be an agreeable surprise to the spectators.

Several floats are being constructed by the committee, among which are "Battleship Oregon," the "Firemen's Float" and two representing the states of the Union. The Chicago Store, J. L. Stockton and several other firms will be represented in the parade. The "Hall of Fame" will be a unique exhibit of artistic sculpture, and will be among the most interesting of the floats. Many boys have signified their willingness to take part in the juvenile part of this parade. Mr. Dinmore is anxious that all boys who wish to secure a place in this interesting part of the day's program see him at once. The main parade will start at 10:30 from the corner of Commercial and Court streets.

The Plug Uglies.

The afternoon parade will be a burlesque on the morning march, and will be engineered by Fred Kurtz, the enterprising butcher of North Commercial street. Burlesque battleships, Goddess of Liberty, and many other floats will be in the march. All those who wish to enter this fun-provoking part of the exercises are requested to see Chairman Kurtz immediately.

FITTING UP FINE OFFICE

SCHOOL MA'AMS COMING

Charter Special Train and Will Hit Salem in a Bunch

Last night's Telegram says: More than 200 school teachers from Portland and Multnomah county will attend the state convention of the Western Division of the State Teachers' Association, to be held at Salem next Monday, Tuesday and Wednesday. The Portland Principals' Association, Teachers' Club and the Multnomah County Teachers' Progressive Club have united and chartered a special train. The train will leave Portland at 7:30 o'clock Monday morning and will arrive at its destination at 9:30 o'clock, only one stop being made during the journey.

Headquarters for the delegations from this county will be at the Hotel Willamette. Arrangements have been made by the Salem teachers for the entertainment of the city's guests. The special will be met at the depot by street cars and the teachers taken to their headquarters. From there they will be assigned to accommodations during their stay in that city.

Arrangements have been made whereby any teachers who have to pass through this city on their way to Salem may stop off here and participate in the excursion. Delegations from Clackamas, Clatsop, Columbia, Washington, Wasco and counties east of the mountains have had special invitations to go to Salem with the Multnomah county delegation.

The special train will leave Salem for Portland Wednesday evening at 5 o'clock, which will give all an opportunity to return to this city in time for the Fourth of July celebration.
