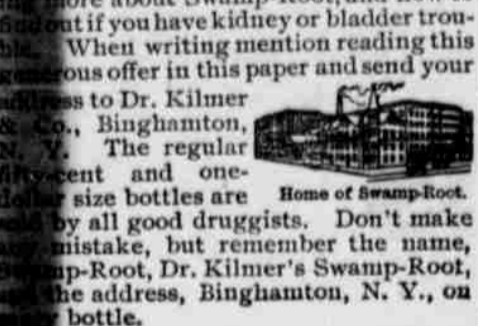

**TOUGH ON THE TROUT**

**Law by Implication Permits Them Being Caught in Any Way**

It is claimed that there is now no closed season for trout other than those in the Umpqua river and its tributaries. This condition has been bought about by an amendment to section 2033, which, while repealing the old section makes no closed season for any stream other than the Umpqua.

The section as amended reads: "It shall be unlawful for any person to take, catch or kill or have in possession any trout except salmon trout, during the months of December, January and February of any year, taken from the waters of the Umpqua river or its tributaries, or at any time to take, catch, kill, or have in possession any trout, char or salmon less than five inches in length, or to take, catch or kill the same by any means whatever except with hook and line, commonly called angling."

It is held that the closed season provision of this amendment of the old law applies only to the Umpqua river and its tributaries, leaving no law whatever providing a closed season for trout fishing in any other stream in the state. The bill was introduced by Representative Jackson of Roseburg, and was passed without change. The amendment is found on page 54 of the 1907 session laws.

The old section, which was superseded by Jackson's bill and is no longer in force, was:

It is doubtful if the law would stand test of the courts. And he who interprets the new section to mean that he can catch fish at any old time may find a bunch of trouble.

If, however, the law will stand—then it is equally certain that the trout may be killed with dynamite, caught with a net, or any other old way the fisherman sees fit to try, for the same amendment, makes it unlawful to take, catch, kill or have in possession any trout char or salmon less than five inches in length or to take, catch or kill the same by any means whatever except with hook and line, commonly called angling. This clause applies, as is easily seen to fish under five inches in length in the waters of the Umpqua only.
