Everything seemed to burn up in drought or be eaten by squirrels. When the railroad came, it changed as if by magic-more acres were broken, the squirrels became scarce and the climate changed for the

Railroads made us what we are."

STANDARD OIL FINANCES.

Justice Landis, before whom the cases against the Standard Oil Company were tried, and WHICH RESULTED IN THE CONVICTION OF THE CORPORATION OF RECEIVING REBATES from the Chicago & Alton Railroad, has caused subpoenas to be issued riceting the appearance of John D. Rockefeller, John D Archibal, Henry H. Rogers and others to testify concerning the financial statuts of Standard Oil. His object is to ascertain the ability of the company to pay the fines which, under the law, may be imposed.

The corporation, after a long trial, was found guilty on 1492 counts of the indictment, and as a maximum fine of \$20,000 may be exacted on each count, it is within the discretion of the court to mulet Standard Oil in the sum of \$29,240,000.

The amount seems large, but when all the circumstances are considered the people would not regard such a fine as excensive.

It is notorious that the vast fortunes of the members of the Standard Oil Company were built up through the instrumentality of evasions of the law forbidding the practice of rebating.

By means of surreptitious arrangements with the railroads THE COR-PORATION WAS ENABLED TO EFFECTIVELY CRUSH OUT OPPOS-TTION AND SUCCEEDED IN ESTABLISHING A MONOPOLY WHICH IT HAS ABUSED TO ROB THE PEOPLE AND EXRICH ITS STOCK-LHDERS.

It would therefore be something like poetle justice to compel Standard Oil to pay twenty-nine millions as fines, as such a payment would practically constitute a restitution of that amount to the people robbed.

Restitution, however, is only a secondary consideration. The greatest benefit that would result from the exaction of a fine votossal in its proportions would be that derived from upholding the majesty of the law and making it clear that a corporation, no matter how powerful, may not violate it with impunity.

The Standard Oil people have for many years labored under the impression that they are above the law, but the imposition of this fine would convince them that they are not ,and the force of the example would not be ignored by other corporations.
