PETITION

WON'T

WORK

About 800 Japanese have signed the petition to President Roosevelt asking him to amend the immigration clause which prohibits the Hawaiian Japanese from going to the mainland. The petition was drawn up by Journalist Negoro, a graduate of the Berkeley University, and was circulated around for signatures.

"Yes, sir, got 800 names to that petition, which will be forwarded to the president of the United States," said Negoro to a Bulletin reporter last night. "The petition has been mailed and is ready for any boat to take it to Washington. The United States government is a government of the people, by the people and for the people, and I take it to mean that every human being is and should be treated equally."

The general opinion of the Japanese community is that when President Roosevelt has carefully read the petition through he will come to but one conclusion and that is to allow the Japanese to enter the mainland freely, just as Americans are enjoying the privilege of going to Japan.

It is expected that a reply to this petition will be received within a few weeks.

Trouble of All Kinds Brewing Among Fresno's Jack Rabbits

Fresno, California, is going to celebrate the Fourth of July and it is going to have at least one unique feature, even if it has to dye to do it. Mayor Lane, of that famous fruit emporium has evolved the idea of capturing 10,000 jack rabbits, dyeing them in bright colors and turning them loose in Fresno streets, the afternoon of the Fourth. The kaleidoscopic effect will be immense and Fresno for a little while, will look like an animated pin wheel of assorted colors, with a periphery of small boys.
