Salem's Latch String Hangs Out Testimony in Haywood Case Nearly Completed

NO CASE AGAINST HAYWOOD

ORCHARD RIDDLED

Protection Must Make a Complete Case in Rebuttal to Win-Gum Shoe Detectives and Mine Owners Divide Honors as Conspirators

Boise, July 3.—When court resumed for the Haywood trial today the defense announced that it expected practically to complete its case, with the exception of reading depositions taken in San Francisco, and the examination of Moyer and Haywood, before the night adjournment. The state today went out on its witnesses who will be called next week in rebuttal. According to Senator Borah not more than a week or ten days will be required to put in the rebuttal evidence. The first witness today was Clifford, a life insurance agent. He knew Pettibone in Denver,

and had desk room in his store. He swore there was only one room in the store, with a basement underneath. The latter was used as a store-room and workshop. He was in the basement daily during his entire residence there, and said he never saw any evidence of the manufacture of bombs or anything like that there. He met Orchard as Hogan in the store four or five times. Orchard told him he was writing hall insurance, and making lots of money. As evidence he presented a check to Pettibone, which was too large for him to cash. Pettibone gave him some money and retained the check. Some time later Orchard told him he was going to the Northwest and later to Alaska. He went away and witness never saw him again. J. C. Barnes, a prospector, of Montrose, Colo., knew George W. Riddell, a Pinkerton operative, in Teluride and Silverton, while he worked as a mill man. Riddell, he swore, on numerous occasions counseled violence. Once he wanted him to blow up the Smuggler Union or the Tom Boy mine. Another time he wanted the pipe line blown up and the town burned, and still another time he wanted the deportees armed with rifles and dynamite to go back and drive the militia out and take the mines.

Arrangements for Salem's big celebration are complete. The buildings on the main streets have been beautifully decorated for the occasion, and though the gentle and never-falling Oregon rain got in its work on the bunting, the city presents a genuine holiday appearance. Hand bills with the line of march, and the time and place of the different events will be distributed for the benefit of visitors Thursday morning, and everything possible to make the day thoroughly enjoyable will be done.

The Y. M. C. A. rooms will be open all day, and visitors are requested to use them, when in need of rest. Apartments will be set aside, especially for ladies and children.

Parade.
The main parade will form on Front street between Chemeketa and Ferry streets, shortly after 10 o'clock a. m., in four divisions. The march will start promptly at 10:30 from the corner of Front and Ferry, and will be led by a trumpeter, clad in armor, and by Grand Marshal Gibson and his aide, Del Dinsmore.

First Division.
The first division will be in charge of Colonel Page and Marshals Stockton, West, Kurtz and Steusloff. The corps of marshals will be followed by Color Sergeant Holman. Then will come in order the Salem Military Band, the Goddess of Liberty car, the Oregon National Guard, speakers in carriages, G. A. R.'s and the committee's carriages.

Second Division.
The second division will be in charge of Marshal Meyers and aide, Chas. Biers.

Then will follow, in order, the Summit band, the "States' Float," Chemawa battalion, Chemawa floats, battleship Oregon, Hall of Fame, and will form between State and Court streets, on Front.

Third Division.
Marshal J. W. Willson and aide, Ab. West, will have charge of the third platoon, which will form on Front street, between Court and Chemeketa. The reform school band will lead, followed by the Salem fire department, the W. O. W. float, W. O. W. lodge drill team, and the various society floats and lodges.

Fourth Division.
The fourth division will be commanded by Marshal Chauncey Bishop and aide, C. B. Bori, and will form on Front street from Chemeketa north. The Victor Point band will furnish the music, and will be followed, in order, by the floats of the Toggery, the Nursery, steam sprayer, Chicago Store, Mitchell, Lewis & Staver, J. L. Stockton and many other private floats.

Line of March.
The parade, starting promptly at 10:30 a. m. from the corner of Front and Ferry streets, will march to the corner of Commercial and Ferry streets, thence north on Commercial to Court, east on Court to Cottage, south on Cottage to State, west on State to Commercial, thence down Commercial to Marion square, where the exercises will be held as follows:

CHICAGO MAY QUIT

Everything Points to Telegraph Operators in Chicago Striking, and the Swift Spreading of the Strike to All the Larger Cities

Chicago, July 3.—Preparations are practically completed by both sides for the anticipated long struggle between the operators and the companies, which are drawing on the telegraph schools and railroad offices for operators. Quarters at a downtown hotel have been engaged for them, and cots have been placed in the main office. Russell today sent out an order to expedite the collection of \$100,000 strike funds.
