PETITIONS KNOCKED OVERBOARD

Judge Galloway Holds Petitions Filed For Referendum Are Defective

Judge Galloway today overruled the demurrers in the two injunction suits against the official free pass referendum, and the referendum to submit the bill for allowing the sheriff of Multnomah county to board prisoners, and dismissed the alternative writ of mandamus asked against the State University tax bill.

This means that, in the opinion of Judge Galloway, the failure to print the warning against illegal signatures at the head of each sheet of 20 names is fatal to the first two named petitions filed with the secretary of state, and the failure to copy the full and correct title of the University tax bill is fatal to that petition.

This virtually knocks out all the referendum petitions that have been filed this year with the secretary of state, as the \$100,000 bill for armories is just the same in having a defective title.

In conclusion of his decision Judge Galloway says: "These suits are unique in the jurisprudence of the state and we believe the court should be most liberal in construing the law in the interest of the public weal; but we also believe the eventual welfare of all the people will be best conserved by a strict performance of the essential requirements of this most wholesome law guaranteeing the right of the initiative and referendum to the people."
