INDIAN GIRLS DROWNED

Sad Ending of the Holiday For the Chemawa School

Nearly two hundred of the girls at the Salem Indian Training school went on a picnic party near Lincoln on the Fourth, and when about half of them were in bathing on the sandbar on the east side of the river two were carried beyond their depth and drowned at about 1 o'clock. The unfortunate girls were Anna Jensen, aged 17 and Jennie Shanshagen, aged 15, both of Alaska. Mary Crider, a third girl, went down, and would have drowned, but was saved by a skillful diver named Nick Mack, aged 18, a California boy, who ran in the Portland-Salem relay race, and who saw her long, streaming hair ribbon in the clear deep water, and seized it and drew her to the surface.

The party of girls was in charge of Officers Spong and Cooper and six young men, who had absented themselves in order to give the girls the freedom of the river. The girls who got into trouble were swimming where a strong current shot over the gravel bar, and were carried beyond their depth, and went down in spite of being able to swim some. Dr. Mott, of Salem and Dr. Tucker, of the school, tried in vain to resuscitate them.

The bodies were recovered where they went down by the efforts of the officers in charge, who got grappling hooks and three boats and dragged the river, and, after being removed to the school, ten ladies of the school and a score of girls lay over the remains until 10 o'clock last night, loath to give them up. But their lives had departed. The funerals will be held at the school this afternoon. No school work was done today, and the government institution is in deepest mourning. Elmer Strahan brought the news of the fatal accident to Salem, where Assistant Superintendent Campbell was in charge of the students who were to take part in the parade.

STATE REUNIONS SUCCESSFUL

Hundreds of Old Neighbors Meet For the First Time

The state reunions planned by the Fourth of July Committee, and put in charge of Hon. F. N. Derby, were a great success. Hundreds of old neighbors from Eastern states, who have made homes in Oregon, met for the first time, and hundreds registered in the books for that purpose suspended from the noble fir trees, each state designated by a banner. Iowa led all the rest in number of registrations. The committee on reception, composed of Mr. and Mrs. F. A. Turner and Mr. and Mrs. E. Hofer, were kept busy handing out the beautiful yellow badges with green lettering, emblematic of the corn and goldenrod, state flower and greatest crop of the Hawkeye state. Two men met from New York who had not seen each other from boyhood. Women met who had parted as girls, and whole families met who did not know that their neighbors in the old home state lived so near by. Following is the registration, giving the number of registrations by individuals and families, some families of five to ten persons taking but a single line on the page. An Outside View of Our Troubles.

The situation in San Francisco never has been paralleled in an American municipality and seldom equaled in the complications of fiction. One might as well, in the thick of the French Revolution, have attempted to tell its outcome, as prophesy the working out of San Francisco's turmoil. Two colossal battles are being fought there, the struggle for civic righteousness and the struggle for what? The fight between capital and labor in San Francisco admits of no such summary judgment as the graft investigation. In the carmen's strike now on, and the general strike and lock-out and tie-up impending, no just person can say either side is in the right, for both are in the wrong.

The situation is complicated by the participation in both struggles of some leading actors. Patrick Calhoun as the accused bribe-giver stands on the defensive before the whole people. As the head and front of the forces working to overthrow unionism in San Francisco, he is far more bitterly assailed by over half of its citizens, and secretly or openly applauded as a savior by the submerged third of its citizenship, the moneyed class.

The "conservative men" of San Francisco feel that the city is doomed if it cannot shake off the yoke of unionism. They are almost willing to hail Calhoun as the striver-weary French public haled Napoleon, if Calhoun can break that iron rule "from below."

The graft prosecution will see things through. It has made good at every step against almost universal incredulity, and with singleness of purpose has kept to its one aim, viz., to land in the State prison the debauchers of government.—William Thompson in The World Today for July.
