Rain in Sherman County.

Seventy-one hundredths of an inch of rain was the amount which fell here last Sunday. The fall was general throughout this section, being more in some places and less in others. At The Dalles the gauge read only two-tenths. Along the Deschutes in Sherman county measurement showed about an inch. At Grass Valley the government gauge read seventy-three hundredths of an inch, and on Gordon Ridge one inch and four-hundredths fell. And Go With the Mazama's to the Summit of Mt. Jefferson

The Mazama's are going to climb Mt. Jefferson, sometime this month, probably about the 22d. A Mazama is a wild mountain goat, but these Mazamas that are mentioned here are not that kind. They are thoroughly gentle, are mostly indigenous to Portland and fit Plato's description of a man perfectly. They take their name from the animal, however, and the society was christened on the summit of Mt. Hood in 1894, at which time Miss May Fuller, a charming young lady and bright newspaper woman, became a Mazama, and, as was remarked at the time, was not only Fuller, but "Fuller an' a goat." The objects of the society are to explore mountains, disseminate information concerning them, protect the forests and encourage mountain climbing. Besides this, the society carries with it an assorted collection of names, one of which it burns into any "licker" lake, or hill, or any old thing that is found loafing around without a tag on it. This is of great convenience to campers, and especially to such persons as miss their bearings, for all they have to do is to ask the lake or other object its name, and they know where they are. Besides it makes the objects named feel like they amounted to something and gives them a chance to be written about and gushed over. The society has a rule strictly forbidding the saddling of names imported from Maine containing any more syllables than the alphabet does letters onto any thing it finds.

Once there was a little lake up north of Mount St. Helens in Washington, and a spinster lady with dark hair, and a fine expression about her chin, who passed the earlier years of her pilgrimage in Aroostook county, Maine, happened across it, and not seeing any brands on it she thought of the dear names of her long-ago childhood's home, and she called that innocent and helpless little lake "Passadumkeag," and blew the name into the glass. That was the last ever seen of that lake. Two years afterward, a couple of prospectors, came across the place where the lake was, but it was dry. There was a notice, posted on the bank, the little pond's last farewell. It stated that it had "been perfectly contented until that man with a blue shirt on had saddled that infernal name on it. It would have stood for Skowhegan, Magalloway, Cauquegonome, Moosetomagantic, or any little thing like that, but to have to pass the years coming to it with the suggestive title of 'Passadumkeag' tacked on to it was too much." The name made it go dry.

It will be seen from this little true story, how beneficial it is to have a Mazama society, with a lot of assorted names, warranted to fit, to find all the lakelets and hills and streams, and things that are still nameless, out in the woods, and put a label on them before some female with a limited imagination and a double-hinged tongue gets a chance at them, with a Memphremagog vocabulary. LAST YEAR'S RECORD.

It Shows 158 Killed and 5,308 Injured.

It will only be a short time until the returns are in for deaths and injuries attending the celebration of the Fourth. The celebration last year made a very fine showing in this line, and its follows:

One hundred and fifty-eight were killed outright or fatally hurt, while 5,308 were injured. Of the 158 killed, 75 died of tetanus. The 83 killed outright are classified as follows: Gunshot wounds killed 38, of which 14 met death from stray bullets; fire resulting from fireworks, burned 18 to death, most of them children; explosions of railway torpedoes, dynamite and powder killed 18; giant firecrackers ended the lives of 3, and cannon killed the same number; a misdirected skyrocket, an effort to avoid a giant firecracker, and a runaway where horses were frightened by firecrackers killed 1 each. An explosion of powder at Wilkesbarre, Pa., killed 6 boys outright.

Of the 5,308 injuries, many were of a serious character, and if there had been no deaths at all these injuries should serve as a warning. Twenty-two lost their sight completely, 72 lost one eye, 56 lost legs, arms or hands, 227 lost fingers.

It was the giant firecracker that caused most of the accidents at the celebration of Bunker Hill day, June 17, in Massachusetts. It was this same noise-maker responsible for the greatest number of injuries the Fourth of 1906. Next in order of the number of injuries caused was firearms. There were 187 injuries from stray bullets and, as has already appeared, 14 deaths outright from stray bullets. The total of injuries from firearms was 532. The toy cannon stood third, and even the explosive cane sent slivers into many legs and ankles.

Dropped Telephone Wire on Light Wire.

Joe Darcy, of this city, says the Albany Democrat of Wednesday, this forenoon was at work on the long distance line of the Home Telephone Company in the city of Corvallis, when he accidentally dropped a loose wire down on the lead wire of the electric light plant near him, receiving a shock from the wire, which resulted in his death about an hour afterwards. He was taken to the home of Jack Clark near by, and everything possible done to save him, but the shock of the 10,000 volt wire was too much to overcome.

After the accident the body had to be hauled down with ropes. His wife and brother-in-law went over in a hack getting there just before he expired. The body was brought to Albany this afternoon and taken to the undertakers.

Mr. Darcy had worked for the Albany electric light company several years, and for others, recently accepting a position as lineman with the Home Company. He was well liked. He leaves a wife who is grief stricken over his death. She has the sympathy of all in her loss.

Mr. Darcy was one of the best baseball players in the valley for many years being prominent in the games played by the Albany club.

Mr. Darcy's parents reside at Aberdeen, and as soon as they can be heard from arrangements will be made for the funeral.

The deceased was a member of the Catholic church and services will be held at the church.
