HIGHWAYMAN AND ROBBER.

Commits Two Crimes and Is Quickly Caught.

S. S. Shuble was assaulted and robbed last night in the vacant lot back of Butte & Wenderoth's saloon, on Commercial street, near Ferry. Shuble was struck on the head with some blunt instrument, and a discolored eye and bruised head this morning give evidence that the blow was a forcible one. The blow knocked Shuble out worse than Burns did Squires, and when he recovered consciousness his watch was gone, and with it had vanished eight big dollars. Deputies Sheriff Minto and Each were stationed at the depot to watch for the criminals, and arrested Tom Driscoll as he was attempting to board the 1:30 train. Driscoll is an ex-convict, having done time in both California and here, and when arrested a full set of burglar tools were found in his possession.

It was discovered this morning that the second-hand store of O. L. McPeck had been burglarized. The burglars tore off a piece of the sheet iron siding on the building in the rear of the store, broke a pane of glass in the back door, and unlocked it. Mr. McPeck made a close examination this morning, but found, so near as he can tell, that his losses were four razors, a gold watch and chain, and a pair of handcuffs. While there was probably more than one connected with the two crimes, the officers are certain they have one of the men.

Model American Farm in Switzerland

In describing the introduction of American silos into Switzerland Consul F. B. Keene writes from Geneva:

Just outside of Geneva there is a small but model American farm, the property of an American gentleman who has long resided in this city (name on file at the Bureau of Manufactures). To a model dairy and equally up-to-date quarters for fowls and swine the owner last autumn added two-seventy-five ton American silos. While twelve acres of fine American corn were being ground and packed into these, farmers came in from the country round about to see what was to them a curiosity and a revelation. There were as

many as fifteen or twenty in a day. These silos were, as far as I know, the first to be set up in Switzerland, during the past winter they have fed fifty head of fine cattle. The practical illustration of wintering thirty head of stock on the twelve-acre crop of corn has resulted in inquiries for seed corn and in orders for three silos by farmers who came, saw and were convinced.

Each of these three silos will be a new advertisement for the system, which is bound to spread. The American model farmer in question grinds his ensilage by electric power. It may be that, in a country abounding in water power, the spread of silos will create a demand for electric motors, in which our American makers may find it profitable to seek their share.
