FIRST STEEL LAID.

Wilsonville Bridge Will Be Completed Soon and Road in November.

Monday witnessed the placing of the first steel on the bridge of the Oregon Electric railway, over the Willamette river, at Wilsonville, and the opinion of the officers of the Willamette Construction Company, which corporation is building the Interurban, the structure will be in shape for the accommodation of construction trains by August 15.

For months, preparatory labor has gone forward for the purpose which has been realized. Delays have been met with in getting the foundations for the piers in shape, and later high water retarded work on the piers proper. In the meantime a line was constructed from Tualatin, on the Southern Pacific, to the bridge, and material was hauled as rapidly as it arrived from the East. With the completion of the bridge a much larger force will be placed in the field between the river and Salem, and it is hoped to start the first passenger train for the Capital City by November 15.

Eight miles of line has been finished north of Salem. For several months the company has operated between Chemawa and Salem with an hourly service, and the scope of service will not be extended until the entire system is ready, though four additional miles of track has been laid north of Chemawa. There remains 19 miles of road to be constructed from the end of the line to the Willamette river, and, with the completion of the bridge, one of the large construction gangs working in South Portland will be dispatched to the valley.
