CANNERY CROWDED TO LIMIT

Manager Fischer Doing All He Can to Expedite Matters

Manager Fisher, of the Salem Mutual Canning Company, was seen today about the congestion of fruit that has swamped the capacity of that institution. The long string of teams that stands for hours in the broiling sun awaiting a chance to deliver, are not the only ones suffering inconvenience. The hot weather is ripening off the raspberries and loganberries all at once, and crowding in all the late cherries earlier than usual, and the result of all three crops being harvested in about one week has produced a condition of things the cannery was not prepared to meet.

A large force is putting up 15 to 20 tons per day, and twice as much is offered. The growers could expedite matters by using all tin tops. Instead of the hallowcks, that have to be packed back into the crates. Most of the growers have but one set of crates, and have to wait to have their own crates emptied and returned to them. The tin-top boxes nest, and are quickly handled. With tin-tops and two sets of crates the growers could all get away in a very short time. Manager Fisher is adding to his force, and will expedite deliveries all that he can, but says he must have the co-operation of the individual growers in equipping themselves to do their part properly.

AFTER THE TOBACCO TRUST

Bonaparte Will Try to Smoke Them Out.

New York, July 10.—Suits were filed in the district court this morning for the dissolution of the American tobacco trust. The court was asked to appoint a receiver.

complaint says the trust will eventually monopolize the tobacco of the world, unless relief is granted.

total assets exceed \$275,000,000. Action is also brought against other corporations, and 29 individuals connected with them. The trust is brought under the Sherman antitrust law. The trust purchases per cent of the total production \$800,000,000 pounds. The general plan of monopolizing is to acquire all successful competition, through one of the confederate companies.

Thomas F. Ryan, the Dukes, Lord and P. A. Wideher are among the defendants.

Judge Reynolds, the government special counsel in the case, said today if the trust lawyers fail to meet the issues raised by the government indictments against the officials of the trust will be sought. For the reason the officials were not called as witnesses before the grand jury.

One object of the suit is to expose the Imperial and British American tobacco companies, two of the defendants on engaging in interstate foreign commerce with in the jurisdiction of the United States.

WATER STARTS FIRE.

Storm Wets Unslacked Lime, and Does Much Damage.

That the storm in the Pleasant valley country a few days ago was the worst that has ever visited Eastern Oregon is proven beyond a doubt, as the details of the damage done continue to come in. William A. Gossett, who is proprietor of the Pleasant Valley lime works had business before the county court today, and in speaking of the damage he said: "The storm which visited our country on the third was the worst in the history of this part of the country. It is hard to tell how much damage was done, although personally it will cost me considerably over a thousand dollars. The large lime works there are on fire, and have been ever since the day of the storm. It is a peculiar fire. Rain started the fire, yet water only adds to its fury. The bins were well filled with dry lime, and when the water got to it a terrific heat was generated. The floors of the different bins burned out and let the contents down in a heated mass. Some of the men tried running water on it, which only made matters worse, and we find the only way to extinguish it is to move the heated lime out. The whole interior of the bins and kiln was a red-hot furnace, made so by water coming in contact with the lime."

Mr. Gossett said the county roads there had been washed out and in many places boulders as large as a horse were deposited in the center of the highway. He thinks it will require the expense of \$1000 to place them in condition as they were. A man by the name of Sutherland came very near losing his life from the raging waters, and his house was filled with five feet of water in less than 30 minutes.

DEMURRER OVERRULED.

The Thiels' Condemnation Proceeding Will Be Heard Soon.

Judge Burnett last night denied the demurrer filed by Carey Martin, attorney for the Thiels, in the condemnation proceedings. Attorney Martin, at the close of the hearing, asked additional time in which to file an answer, but the request was denied. The answer is required to be filed by 5 o'clock today. This is the suit of the state against Mr. and Mrs. Thiel, of Turner, to get possession of their farm of about 85 acres, which will be used for the home for the feeble minded.

Attorney-General Crawford is anxious that the case be heard at once.

Rushing Work on Commercial Bridge

The General Construction Company, which has the contract to make 50 feet of the fills on either side of the concrete bridge across Mill creek, on North Commercial street, and the Capital Improvement Company, which has the contract for the remainder of the fills, have 14 teams and a large number of men at work, and will rush their contracts to completion at the earliest possible date. In speaking to a Journal reporter this morning, John Smart, the local representative of the General Construction Company, said: "Our work will probably be finished this week, and as soon this is accomplished it will not take long for the other fills to be made, as the Capital Improvement Company has the work well in hand. We are all anxious that the contract be finished as soon as possible, and will use every effort to hasten the work."
