this variety was never surpassed anywhere.

Too much cannot be said of the packing, and while most of the fruit showed that experts did the work, yet there were some boxes so perfectly packed that they demonstrated how much the beauty of the exhibit was enhanced by artistic work.

Besides the cherries there were several small fruits, that is they were classed as small fruits, though there were blackberries and Loganberries nearly, if not quite, two inches in length, and some splendid showings in raspberries. There was also a fine display of gooseberries that made one think old Dame Nature had in a generous mood been making footfalls for the Brownies.

The attendance has been good, and the many papers read, have proved of much interest. The preparation of the papers showing that the fruit growers were adepts at writing, as well as fruit growing, and that much study had been given to all branches of commercial fruit growing, from the nursery to the returns from the commission men. The interest taken in the exhibit is shown by the fact that growers and nurserymen were present from all parts of the state. Hood River had several representatives, State Horticulturist R. H. Weber, Dr. Sanders and several others were present from The Dalles. Judd Geer was down from Union county, and the fine fruit section of Southern Oregon was also ably represented.

A Tacoma Murder.

Tacoma, July 11.—Crazed by jealousy Frank Harvey, an Englishman, aged 56, this morning shot and killed Miss Gertrude Hall, a widow, aged 60, proprietor of a lodging house, and seriously wounded Sherman Blanchard, a supposed rival, who was visiting the woman. Covered with blood, and with the pistol in his hand, the murderer boarded a street car, and caused a panic among the passengers, when he assured them he was on his way to the police station to surrender. The conductor turned him over to the police.

Jap Smuggling Station.

Los Angeles, July 11.—A Japanese farm house, near Inglewood, which was thought to be one of a chain of stations extending from the Mexican border, through which coolie laborers were being smuggled into California, was raided by immigration officers this morning, and five Japanese captured, who admitted that they had just arrived. It has long been suspected by officials that hundreds of Japanese were being smuggled overland into the United States.

Uttering and Reading Centers in the Brain.

"The discovery of a special speech region in the brain furnished a key for unlocking one chamber after another of this mysterious physical organ of the mind. Even as regards the faculty of speech itself, it was soon revealed that it had three separate anatomical seats in the brain—one for hearing words, another for seeing and a third for speaking them.

"How separate and distinct from this uttering center the brain place for reading is was illustrated by a lady patient of mine, who was astonished one morning at finding that she could not read a word in anything, whether newspaper or book. She thought something must be wrong with her eyes, but she saw everything about the room as well as ever and could sew and knit. I tested her speech carefully, and found that she could hear every word addressed to her and could talk remarkably well. Her reading brain center, however, had been destroyed in the night without her waking by a plug in the little artery which supplies that place, and she forthwith became as illiterate as a Papuan savage, nor did she learn to read again, succumbing to apoplexy two years afterward.

"Generally more than one speech center is injured by an apoplectic hemorrhage in the brain, as was the case with a patient of mine, a gentleman who, one morning, lost not only all power of utterance, but also of ability to read. He could, however, hear words perfectly, and strange to tell, he proved that the place for arithmetical figures is in a different brain locality from that for words, because he could read and write figures and calculate every kind of sum in large business transactions, which he successfully conducted for seven years afterward without once being able to speak a word or even to read his own signature."—Dr. Hanna Thomson in Everybody's.

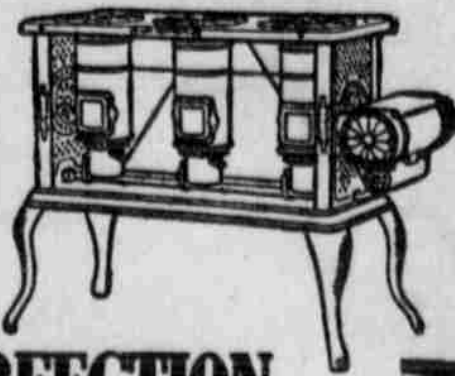

Bad Brand of Booze.

Heppner, Or., July 11.—Clyde Royse, who has been on a several days' spree in this city, went to a hardware store and bought a revolver yesterday afternoon. Last evening he flashed the gun in several people's faces, threatening them, also telling different persons that he was going to kill himself. Marshal Gurdane and Deputy Sheriff Gus Mallory, when attempting to arrest Royse at about 8:30 last evening, met with considerable opposition. Royse stuck his gun in Mallory's face, and held the officers at bay for some moments.

He was put under bonds to appear at 10 o'clock this morning in police court. Judge Williams fined him \$20, and immediately Sheriff Shutt filed complaint against him for resisting an officer. He was placed under \$500 bonds to appear before the grand jury in September. At a late hour last night Royse attempted to kill himself by cutting his

throat with a pocket-knife. He was found, at 7 o'clock this morning,

stopped by Deputy Sheriff Mallory and another prisoner. Royse is a young man raised at Hardman, in this county, and has always been considered a very peaceable fellow.

Claims Company Was Negligent.

A complaint has been received by the railroad commission from Otto J. Kraemer, charging the Astoria & Columbia River Railroad Company with discourteous treatment of its patrons. The incident which gave rise to the complaint is set forth as occurring on July 8th, at Astoria, where the southbound train was held one hour to wait for a special, so that five or six empty coaches of the special could be attached to the regular, and by reason of not being on time the train was held another hour at Goble, thus holding 300 passengers for two hours, when the delay could have been avoided.

Smothered in a Mine.

Freeland, Pa., July 11.—Seven miners are dead from white damp in the Audenried mine. Two men entered to measure the water and failed to come out. Foreman Lee and four men, who went to rescue the others, were overcome by gas and died. Others entering the mine were brought out unconscious.

Auto Turned Turtle.

Toledo, O., July 11.—The first accident of the Glidden tour occurred at 6 o'clock this morning, when the car of Krotes, of Cleveland, turned turtle six miles west of Toledo, in-juring Otis, his wife and Miss H. Rollins.

The Glidden cars left this city for the 166 mile run to South Bend, Ind., at 7 o'clock this morning.
