

EUGENE FORGES AHEAD

Puts Up the Coin, and Electric Road to the Siuslaw Is Assured

Eugene, July 15.—This city enters today upon a new period of expansion in the race for the rank of second city of the state. Work starts today on the bitulithic paving contracts, and the new electric line to be constructed from this city to Springfield, and on up the McKenzie.

The required \$50,000 stock subscriptions for the railroad which Stephen Carver proposes to build from Eugene to the mouth of the Siuslaw river has at last been secured among the people of Eugene and along the route of the proposed line, and the road is now assured. The committee of Eugene business men who had this matter in charge received the last subscription yesterday afternoon, and Mr. Carver was at once notified.

The next step to be taken will be the organization of a company among the citizens of the city and surrounding country, with Mr. Carver as president, and after that the work of constructing the road will at once begin. Fifteen miles of rails are now on the way to Eugene from Pittsburg for the road and they are now due to arrive in Portland. They will be shipped on up to this city upon their arrival there.

It is planned to build at least ten miles of the road this summer and fall and complete the first 20 miles next spring and summer. This will take the road into the tall timber on the upper Siuslaw, and if it never extended further, it will be a paying proposition, as the timber traffic would be immense, to say nothing of the hundreds of tons of fruit and country produce that it would afford transportation for.

The right-of-way for the road for several miles out of Eugene has already been secured, and option have been taken on land here for terminal grounds. As soon as the company is incorporated surveys will at once be started, and construction work will follow as soon thereafter as possible.

After the 20 miles of railroad are finished, it is planned to bond the line and extend it on to the head of navigation on the Siuslaw river or possibly on to the mouth of the river at Florence. It is thought that the entire line can be completed within three years from now. There is a good route over the Coast mountains with an easy grade and few if any tunnels will have to be constructed.

It is reported that Mr. Carver has made a proposition to the people of Corvallis that if they will raise \$30,000 in stock subscriptions he will build a line out of that city to connect with the line from Eugene to the Siuslaw. If this is built it will give Eugene an independent line to Willamette river navigation, thus giving the local shippers entire independence from the Southern Pacific Company.
