

AMONG THE MAKERS OF OREGON

Hon. C. B. Moores, who has been in New York and other Eastern cities for several months, writes that Oregon is not mentioned very much in the Associated Press dispatches. He says how in three months he barely saw five little items of Oregon news in all the Eastern papers. He must be mistaken. This great state, twice as big as Iowa, the richest state on the Northwest Pacific coast, could not be so completely shut out of the news as that by the Associated Press. The Capital Journal has no disposition to criticize the Associated Press, and furthermore the chairman of the executive committee of that powerful news-distributing agency is Mr. Scott, of the Oregonian, at Portland. It is not possible that he has so completely allowed Oregon to be excluded from the news channels of the world. That could not be his intention, when the whole state is bending its energies to get itself before the world. Now let us all meet and serene disposition under the eclipse. Mr. Moores has undoubtedly told the truth, and, while Portland is being well advertised from within her own resources, the state, as a whole, has not much mention made of it in the affairs of the world, except for its land frauds, and general political wickedness.

The Salem high school is now admitted to be one of the finest in the West. City Superintendent Powers has quietly built up the schools with good, practical course of study. To show the thoroughness of some of its work, let it be mentioned that while the state course of textbooks requires but one book in reading for the first year's work in the public school. The beginners go through the first half of the year, and go through three other first readers. Then the second half of the year they get four reading books, and all these supplementary readers are furnished the children free. So the first year the child practically gets through eight reading books, and it is all done in a thoroughly enjoyable way. The two new members of the school board show signs of being progressive men. They are asking questions about vocal music and drawing. They do not seem to be concerned to hold of any little petty grafts, or to have any personal pets to reward, but seem inclined to look upon their duties from a public standpoint. That kind of work will build up the reputation of this city for splendid public schools, and will be one of

the great magnates to draw people to live at the Capital City, which today offers more advantages as a city of homes and industries than any city on the coast. Live and progressive policies of administration would make it the live interior city of the state, and it would grow like a weed.

What cap the Portland newspapers gain by incessant warfare on E. H. Harriman? Those papers seem published on the line of treating Harriman as the greatest criminal of the age. Editorially and in their news columns, their arraignment of Mr. Harriman is constant. Their vituperation is uninterrupted. What has Oregon to gain by making itself especially obnoxious to Mr. Harriman? What do we care if he made twenty millions on the Chicago & Alton deal? The high crimes and misdemeanors he is guilty of in the eyes of the Roosevelt administration, in merging the different railroads he has secured control of, is a crime against the United States, and against half a dozen particular states, as much as it is against Oregon. Is Oregon to vindicate the outraged public sentiment of the whole United States, all to make political capital for a few newspaper politicians? Oregon needs new railroads badly, and we would rather have Harriman a friendly factor in the upbuilding of the state than all the cheap political glory of making him do things that in the end will not benefit us one cent. We would rather have Harriman agree to build 200 miles a year in Oregon than all the interstate commerce rot that can be stacked up in the way of decisions for the next ten years. Oregon needs more railroads and more people. Do not forget that.

Miss Reel, superintendent of Indian schools, is attending the National Educational Association at Los Angeles, and will, on her return up the coast, stop at the Salem Indian Training school, and probably take her customary vacation at Yaquina Bay. Her championship of new methods of Indian school work has had a marked effect upon the product of these government schools. One of her foremost supporters is Miss Frances Bowman, of the Chemawa school. Miss Bowman was on the program at the Tacoma Institute of Indian School Workers last year, and gave a practical demonstration of the new lines of work, under the direction of Miss Reel. Miss Bowman is at present in charge of a party of Indian children taking them to their homes in Alaska, and will be away six weeks.

Notice of Intention to Improve a Portion of Broadway Street in the City of Salem, Oregon.

TO WHOM IT MAY CONCERN:

Notice is hereby given that the common council of the city of Salem, Oregon, deems it expedient to improve, and proposes to improve, Broadway street in said city from a point 518 feet south of the center line of Belmont street, northerly to the center line of Norway street in said city, except a strip eight feet wide in the center of said portion of Broadway street now occupied by the track of the Oregon Electric Co., with full intersections in the following manner, to-wit:

By grading the roadway of said portion of said street full width except a said strip eight feet wide in the center of said portion of said street, with full intersections to the proper sub-grade, and by thoroughly rolling the sub-grade of said street and by placing thereon crushed rock in layers to the depth of eight inches, and by thoroughly rolling said crushed rock.

Also by constructing wooden curbs along both sides of said portion of said street.

All of said improvements to be made in accordance with the charter of the city of Salem, Oregon, and the plans, specifications and estimates for the doing of said work heretofore adopted by the common council of said city and now on file in the office of the recorder of said city, to which said plans, specifications and estimates the attention of all persons interested in said improvement is hereby called.

The cost of all of said improvement to be assessed to the owners of property adjacent to said portion of said street hereby proposed to be improved.

Remonstrances against the above improvement may be filed in writing with the city recorder of said city within ten days from the final publication of this notice.
